RUSSIA'S PACIFIC SHORE STRONG, IS NOTICE TO JAPAN

MOSCOW, Oct. 5.—(AP)—Soviet Russia openly boasted today that her Pacific shore line is impregnable.

The boast came at the conclusion of Vladivostok naval and air maneuvers, which gave the eastern sector the most realistic taste of war since the reds drove out the whites in 1920.

There can be no doubt that any military force which might attempt to land on the soviet coast, no matter how well prepared it might be, would be hurled into the sea, said Pravda, the communist party organ.

The statement was regarded as a warning to Japan, just as pointed and direct as the recent speech of War Commissar Klement Voroshilov at Kiev, which was interpreted as a warning to Germany against aggression from the west.

The sea games followed a simulated air attack on Vladivostok, with the populace scurrying to gas chambers while ground batteries boomed to fight off the "invading" planes.

Simultaneous Battle Sea maneuvers were concluded with a mock attack on the Kronstadt base.
