

REBEL ARTILLERY COVERS ADVANCE TOWARD MADRID

Insurgents Occupy Strategic Towns of Santa Cruz, Huecas in Fierce Fighting — Planes Aid in Attack

BURGOS, Spain, Oct. 7.—(AP)—Under cover of a withering artillery barrage, insurgent divisions on the northern front hammered at Madrid today in the "final, decisive" attack on the capital.
With a spear-head driven to within 20 miles of the city on the southern front, General Francisco Franco's regulars began pinching off a 50-mile sector from Navalperal de Pinar, northwest of Madrid, to Torreon, 16 miles southeast of the capital on the Toledo highroad.
Towns Occupied
In rapid succession, a column swept the Santa Cruz del Retamar sector, insurgent headquarters said, occupying the strategic towns of Santa Cruz, Huecas, Puensalida and Portillo.
The battle for Santa Cruz was fought fiercely through three lines of trenches, the fascist attackers marching into the village after night-fall while the government forces retreated in disorder to the northeast. Three insurgent columns participated in the advance with the support of artillery batteries and fighting and bombing planes.
The insurgent high command also announced the capture of Berriatua, a village in the Bilbao sector southwest of the coastal town of Ondarroa.
The driving attack in the Santa Cruz sector drew a wide procession of fascist legionnaires and regulars over the rolling territory under protection of an artillery barrage.
As the advance progressed, insurgent bombing planes blasted government positions with terrific damage. Only a single government plane ventured out to oppose the bombardment.

PRINCE OF SULU FORGETS THRONE IN LAW MAKING

MANILA (UP)—Datu Ombra, member of the national assembly, but also husband and royal consort of Princess Dayang Dayang, acting sultan of Sulu, displays more of the characteristics of an American congressman than those of an aspirant to a throne.
Immediately upon his arrival here from Jolo, capital of the province of Sulu, which he represents in the national assembly, Datu Ombra instead of making any preparations to one day sit on the throne of his royal wife on the throne of Sulu, filed 10 appropriation bills for public works in the province of Sulu.
These bills, totaling about \$100,000, called for about everything from wharves, roadways, a monument to Jose Rizal, "Father of Philippine Independence," schools, ranging from emergency and primary ones to high schools, a complete radio station and everything else that the province of Sulu needs.
After first doing his duty thus to his constituents, Datu Ombra took time off to satisfy a little the natural curiosity of his colleagues and the press about the real status of the affairs of the acting sultan of Sulu, his wife.
"The sultanate (or succession of Sulu) is a dead issue," he declared, "and peace reigns all over the province. There is no law or tradition to bar Princess Dayang Dayang from occupying the throne since the death of her husband, the late sultan, the late Sultan Kiram. Likewise, the princess has the support of the great majority of the Sulus."
About the only question which Datu Ombra refused to answer was whether he eventually would ascend to the sultanate himself as the consort of his princess wife, the present acting sultan of Sulu.
Instead, he made it clear that like

DANGER OF JOKES IN SICK ROOM IS TOLD BY DOCTOR

Very Few Lay Persons Know How To Talk To The Ill, Physician Says—Worry Held Recovery Barrier.

CHICAGO (UP)—Hearty visitors who enter the sickroom with booming, well-intentioned references to the mosquito or operating room actually may become a contributing factor to a patient's death, according to Dr. George B. Lake, editor of Clinical Medicine and Surgery.
"Few people, except experienced physicians, know how to talk to an acutely sick man," he said, writing in the Radiologic Review.
"Lugubrious anecdotes all too frequently contribute to an unfavorable outcome."
The patient who worries, or is afraid, always has an uphill fight to recovery, the physician said.
"This fear or worry need not be with regard to physical condition. A man may be distressed because he is not carrying enough life insurance; because his rent is overdue.
"A woman may be violently perturbed because she has discovered a few gray hairs or 'crow's feet' because she fears she is losing her husband's love. Both men and women have died because they feared the loss of friends or social position, or had a feeling of remorse for past mistakes.
Urges Careful Study
Such fears and worries, he said, "are not immaterial and foolish, and they deserve the earnest attention and study of the physicians who aspire to achieve high and lasting success."
Deeply hidden mental or physical reactions frequently result from acts which the individual recognizes as opposed to his own or the community's code of morals, the physician said.
Emotional instability caused by faulty heredity or dyogenic matings often is an important factor in causing and perpetuating distressing symptoms, Dr. Lake said.
Most of these persons, he said, are "chronics" who for years have been going from one physician to another with but little relief. Some have been inadequately described for, others have been dismissed brusquely and told nothing was wrong.
"In the latter case it is unscientific and untrue to declare that nothing ails the patient. If he were not ill he would not have sought medical advice. His psyche is as much a part of his organism as is his thorax or abdomen and, until it has been painstakingly examined, the study of the case is incomplete, the physician said.
Must Be Minimized
The emotionally unstable person frequently finds himself unable or unwilling to face the true cause of his distress, he said.
"The man who 'cannot tell a lie' has no place in the medical profession, according to Dr. Lake.

MANILA, P. I., Oct. 7.—(AP)—Hundreds of lepers paraded the streets of Manila early today after escaping from San Lazaro hospital.

The lepers were granted a permit to parade yesterday but at the last minute it was revoked. They responded by overpowering hospital guards at 8 a. m., and escaping over a wall.
