ENGLAND SPURRED TO SWIFT ACTION BY SOVIET THREAT

open hostility in the Mediterranean, should Russian ships seek to land supplies at Spanish government ports guarded by fascist warships.

The Moscow ultimatum was delivered to representatives of countries signatory to the non-intervention pact in London last night. It detailed alleged shipments of arms, planes and even poison gas to Spanish insurgents, specifically naming Germany, Italy and Portugal.

"The Soviet government cannot consent to conversion of the non-intervention pact into a screen for concealing military assistance rendered the rebels against the government by some participants of the pact," said the statement.

It added: "If violations are not stopped immediately, the Soviet government will free itself from any obligations to the agreement."

Captain Eden, en route home, will confer in Paris tomorrow with Premier Leon Blum of France concerning Anglo-British action in the new crisis.

British officials maintained the most discreet silence concerning the affair pending tomorrow's meeting. Apparently they had recovered from the initial shock of the outspoken Russian communication, which flatly accused Italy, Germany and Portugal of giving military assistance to the fascist insurgents in Spain.

VOTER REGISTRY COUNT NEXT WEEK

Final figures on the Jackson county registration for the general election, Tuesday, November 3, will not be available before next week. It was announced by the county clerk's office this morning.

Extra clerks have been placed at work to expedite the count and classification by parties of the voters, for early presentation to the secretary of state, for the printing of the official ballots.

Not all of the registration cards for the Ashland precincts have been turned in.

County Clerk Carter estimates 1000 new voters registered in the county this year, and total registration close to the 20,000 mark. Many of the new

voters hail from North Dakota, South Dakota, Kansas, Nebraska, Oklahoma, and Arkansas. The last named state, has so far shown the largest number of former residents, a large number of registrants also formerly lived in Josephine county.

DUCE'S SON-IN-LAW BEING GROOMED FOR POWER ASSUMPTION

ROME, Oct. 8. — (AP) — Premier Mussolini is grooming his son-in-law, Count Galeazzo Ciano, as his successor, political circles asserted today, and soon may make him head of the fascist cabinet.

II Duce would remain as dictator under his title of "capo del governo" (head of the government). It was reported, and Ciano would retain his present post as foreign minister.

The elevation of Ciano, informed sources declared, will be discussed at a meeting of the fascist grand council in November.

They pointed out the change would have only a slight practical effect at present, but would furnish the premier with a successor upon his death.

II Duce bears the double title "Capo del governo e primo ministro" (head of the government and prime minister). Political circles declared he can separate the first official designations and give the second of these to another without affecting his real position.
