## MARITIME STRIKE THREAT REVIEWED AT TRAFFIC MEET

Alex Chalmers, of the Chalmers Shipping Co. in Portland, discussed phases of the maritime unions dispute today at the weekly meeting of the Rogue River Valley Traffic Association. Chalmers, speaking of the possibilities of a general strike when the present truce ends Oct. 15, stated that it is impossible to determine the likelihood of a strike but that in his opinion it would be averted, due probably to government pressure brought to bear on one side.

Chalmers added that the unions are not inclined to arbitrate but each employer separately. The situation, he said, appears to have definite political aspects.

Jack Spalding, sales manager of Southern Oregon Sales, Inc., reporting on a meeting of directors of the northwest fruit subsidy organization in Portland yesterday, stated that the group passed on the final draft of the federal fruit subsidy plan and returned it to Washington, D. C. for the signature of the secretary of agriculture.

Following the secretary's final approval, the agreement will be presented to growers and shippers for signing preparatory to putting the plan into operation, Spalding said. Joseph Oetle, freight and passenger agent for the Southern Pacific railway, stated that the line had requested authority to publish a freight rate slightly above Hood River rates so that should a maritime strike tie up Portland shipping valley produce could be re-routed through Canadian ports.
