de la Rocque's social party resulted from "an order from Berlin."

The extreme leftists announced plans to take all party chieftains and their entire parliamentary delegations into the region for the rallies Saturday and Sunday. Sites for the meetings were not announced, but were expected to include Strasbourg, Nancy, Mulhouse and Colmar.

The gatherings will be heavily guarded, the government declared in disclosing plans to send large detachments of mobile guards and police to the provincial cities.

NEW YORK, Oct. 9.—(AP)—Shaking off profit taking in its stride, the stock market today thrust through a new five-year top for its fifth consecutive session.

Gains of fractions to 25 or more points were widely distributed with steel, lagging for most of the day, coming up briskly in the final hour. Motor, merchandise, oil, rail and specialty issues were out in front. Transfers were around 2,200,000 shares.

The list took nourishment from business and industrial news and failed to show a great deal of concern over the cloudier European situation.
