

TOMATO GROWERS REAPING BENEFITS OF FAIR WEATHER

The Bagley Canning company in Ashland today started on the 42nd day of packing tomatoes after the longest and heaviest season on record. And the fruit is still flooding into the Ashland plant at the rate of between 75 and 80 tons each day, after a season's average of over 60 tons per day, according to Ralph Koozer, manager of the cannery.

"Already we have exceeded last year's total pack by over 50 per cent," Koozer said. "And if the favorable weather continues, we will be running full shifts for at least another week, although some of the fields are now fairly well depleted."

Ordinarily the tomato season would be over and frost would have spoiled the remaining crop by this time of year, the Ashland manager said. He stated that the farmers and the cannery were both reaping exceptional benefits from the prolonged fair weather, with hundreds of farmers making more off their tomatoes than they have ever before realized.

A bright side of the frost situation for the farmer has been revealed in experimental shipments by the Pacific Fruit and Produce company here. According to J. P. Naumes, carlot sales executive with headquarters in Medford, several carloads of green tomatoes have been shipped east, ripening enroute and arriving in prime condition for sale.

Naumes announced that the experiments tend to prove that tomatoes can be picked green with good results, opening a new market for that kind of fruit. Ordinarily the first frost blights the vines and leaves the fruit in no condition for canning or packing, but, according to Naumes, frost will leave many of the green tomatoes still in shipping condition.

The green shipments will mean a saving of thousands of dollars to valley farmers who have seen their tomatoes rot in the field after the first frost has spoiled them for canning. Naumes pointed out. Several more car loads of the green fruit will be shipped this year, he said.

STUDENTS LEARN BANK ACTIVITIES

Metzger plans other visits for the class to business houses of the city and also contemplates a series of talks to the students by merchants and professional men of the city.

Metzger is to take a trade class to visit the city fire hall tomorrow morning, on the invitation of Fire Chief Elliott.

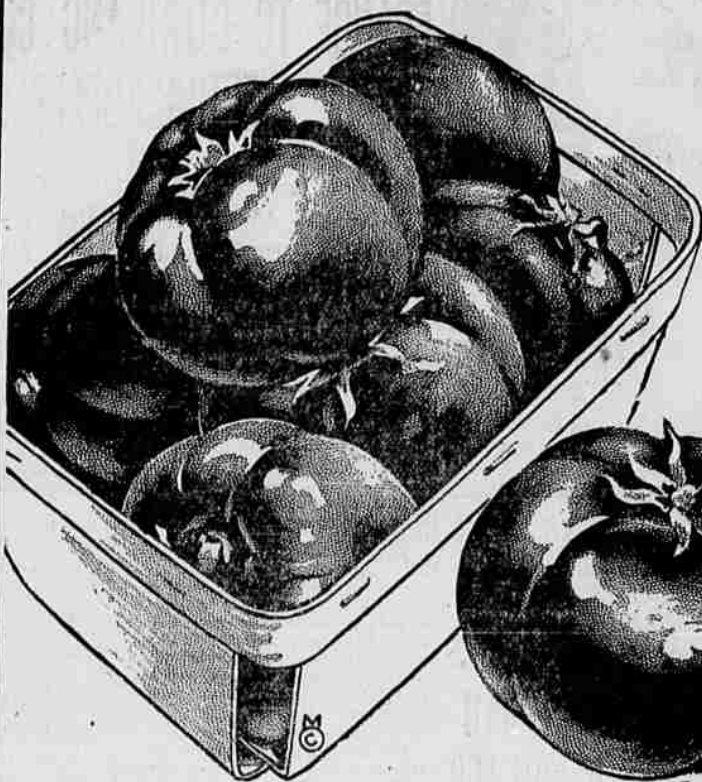
