SEATTLE, Oct. 9.—(AP)—The coast guard patrol boat Morris pressed through the Gulf of Alaska today toward the freighter Tanana at Dry Spruce bay, Kodiak island, though labor troubles aboard the cargo cargo vessel were settled.

District coast guard headquarters here said instructions to the Morris were unchanged since it was ordered Tuesday to investigate difficulties which Capt. H. Rynning of the Tanana described as "mutiny."

Official comment was withheld, but informed sources said it was highly improbable the coast guard would act against members of the crew unless Captain Rynning made formal charges. The Morris was expected to reach the Tanana late today.

MOORE TRAINING TO PUMMEL PETE

Gene Moore, colorful drop-kicking wrestler who challenged Pete Belcastro to a duel with boxing gloves and had the challenge accepted by the big Italian, is taking his grudge battling seriously. Since he has not battled under Queensbury rules for some time, he has taken to carrying weights around in his hands, holding them at arm's length for several minutes at a time.

ENROLLMENT UP IN CITY SCHOOLS

Reports on attendance in city schools at the end of the first four week period show an increase of 73 students, concentrated principally in the senior and junior high schools, with Jackson and Lincoln schools showing a decrease.

Present enrollments, compared with those at the same time last year, are as follows: High school, 706 and 553; junior high, 684 and 661; Jackson, 301 and 309; Lincoln, 255 and 260; Roosevelt, 303 and 303; Washington, 393 and 384.

City Superintendent Hedrick's office stated that a gradual increase in registration is expected throughout the year, although most students who did not enroll at the beginning of the term because of employment outside are now attending classes.

Reports are not yet completed for county schools, according to C. H. Bowman, county school superintendent.
