

# MANY NEW FACES WILL BE SEEN IN COMING CONGRESS

## 16 Democrats, 9 Republican Senators Renominated — 67 Will Not Return to Next Session of House

By EDWARD J. DUFFY (Associated Press Staff Writer) WASHINGTON, Oct. 9. — (AP) — Defeats at the polls, retirements and deaths have already made certain that many new faces will appear in the next congress. Major party nominations were completed only yesterday with the Re-

publican state convention in Rhode Island. It is now possible for the first time to summarize results of the primaries and conventions which have dotted the country almost every week since the spring.

16 Democrats Renominated. Sixteen Democratic senators were renominated, one defeated—the blind Senator Gore of Oklahoma. Nine Republican incumbents were renominated, including White of Maine, already re-elected. The lone loser was Senator Couzens of Michigan.

Six senators did not seek renomination, but one of these, the Independent Republican, Norris of Nebraska, is now running independently, with administration benediction. Senator Benson of Minnesota chose to contest for the governorship as the farmer-labor nominee. Those retiring voluntarily are Mrs. Huey Long, of Louisiana; Costigan of Colorado, Coolidge of Massachusetts, and Keyes of New Hampshire. Senators Trammell and Fletcher of Florida and Murphy of Iowa, Democrats, died.

67 Out in House. Of the 435 members of the house, 67 will not return. Those not candidates for renomination numbered 33, while 18 were defeated and 15

died. Exactly 80 per cent of the membership last session is standing for re-election.

Undeterred by the failure of Governor Brann in Maine to go from the state house to the senate in the September election, six other state executives are seeking to make that grade. They are Johnson in Colorado, Rose in Idaho, Herring in Iowa, Curley in Massachusetts, Green in Rhode Island and Bridges in New Hampshire. All save Bridges are Democrats.

Five Moving Up. Five members of the house won senatorial nomination: Lundeen, Minnesota farmer-laborite; Christianson, Minnesota Republican; and Lee of Oklahoma, Brown of Michigan and Rogers of New Hampshire, Democrats. Aspiring representatives who lost in the senatorial primaries were Utterback of Iowa, Sandlin of Louisiana, Monaghan of Montana and Eagle of Texas.

The representatives defeated for renomination include four in Pennsylvania, Richardson, Berlin, Brooks and Moritz; three in Louisiana, Monteil, Wilson and Sanders; two in New York, Tony and Duffy, and others as follows:

Huddleston, Ala.; Hoepfel, Calif.; Sears, Fla.; Main, Mich.; Clairborne, Mo.; Fiesinger, Ohio; Gassaway, Okla.; Blanton, Tex. and Darden, Va.

With his renomination by the Rhode Island Republicans, Senator Metcalf took his place for the November contest alongside these party colleagues also renominated: Hastings, Del.; Borah, Idaho; Dickinson, Iowa; Capper, Kas.; Barbour, N. J.; McNary, Ore. and Cerey, Wyo.

**Diagonal Highway Urged in Portland**  
PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 9.—(AP)—A diagonal highway across Portland to link fast traffic with main routes will be proposed to the Oregon highway commission by a group of west side business property owners.

The route would interconnect with the Ross Island bridge, Barbour

boulevard, Linnton and Canyon road, which will soon lead to the Wilson River and Wolf Creek shortcuts to the sea.

The commission will be asked to purchase rights of way with the aid of federal funds.

**Carriers Called To Survey Rules**  
SALEM, Ore., Oct. 9.—(AP)—Common carriers and contract carriers under the public utilities commissioner were called to Portland October 13 to consider changes in rules resulting from a survey conducted the past year by the commission.

The changes, governing the operation of both freight and passenger carriers, will affect all drivers, Frank C. McCulloch, public utilities commissioner, said, and it was important they all be present at the hearing. The rules, unless contested, will go into effect at once. No major changes were recommended, but other suggestions will be considered, McCulloch said. The revised order will be issued following the hearing.

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### LACK OF RAIN DELAYS UMATILLA PLANTING

PENDLETON, Ore., Oct. 9.—(AP)—Umatilla county wheat growers squinted impatiently into clear skies this week as winter drew nearer with no promise of the rains needed before fall seeding can get under way. A survey today indicated that, unless an adequate rain comes within the next fortnight, practically all farmers in the vicinity of Pendleton will postpone planting until spring.

Pendleton grain dealers, experienced observers of the growers' annual bout with nature, were unanimous in declaring that the 1937 harvest would be almost entirely of spring grain unless rain comes within the next two weeks.
