1937 PLYMOUTHS ON DISPLAY BY LANGE MOTOR CO.

Crowds were thrilled at the pre-showing of the new 1937 Plymouth automobile at the Lange Motor Car Co. Saturday, according to H. F. Lange.

Throughout the whole car engineering refinements and improvements have been made. Every change is a refinement which makes it a higher value, according to Plymouth engineers.

his campaign special from Lincoln, where he told a huge crowd in front of the state capitol he was confident of the result of the November election and said money spent by the administration to feed millions of families had been expended "in a good cause."

He promised there that "as long as I have anything to do about it," there "never will be a federal tax on farms or homes."

He said, at Lincoln, his own seven-sentence record of aid to farmers could be expanded by every man and woman on a farm in terms of the recovery that has come to each of them in the last three and a half years.

This was the record he outlined:

1. Raised farmers' net annual income by \$3,500,000,000.
2. Saved thousands of homes and farms from foreclosure and reduced farmers' debts.
3. Started recovering the farmers' foreign markets.
4. Restored national income and prepared for a steady, long-time expansion of the farmer's home market.
5. Ended a policy of immediate glut and eventual waste and laid the basis for permanent plenty.
6. Begun to get the farmer a fair share in comforts, advantages, wider interests and deeper satisfaction "which go to make the good life for himself and for his children."
7. Rushed immediate and direct relief to farmers and stockmen struck by drought.

"There is the record," he said.

MUSSOLINI GEARS UP WAR MACHINE

ROME, Oct. 10.—(P)—Premier Benito Mussolini assured the cabinet and the nation today Italy's vast war machine is being toolled into still greater perfection.

"Military preparations of the nation are being intensified with best results," Mussolini said. The cabinet then adopted his recommendations for increasing length of the work week and for co-ordinating national defenses.

The weekly work schedule was stepped up to 60 hours to increase production of war materials by 1200 industries—for the army estimated with reserves to number more than 9,000,000 men.

TEXAS ENROLLEES IN CCC ARRIVE FOR PROJECT HERE

A new CCC company arrived here from Texas yesterday to occupy Camp Prescott and continue the work projects in the Prescott Memorial park started by Co. 1652 which was disbanded Friday.

The Texas outfit was Co. 3864, commanded by First Lieut. Nick V. Fletcher, PA-Res. With him was First Lieut. Edward M. Carl, Jr., PA-Res., First Lieut. Robert Searight, Med-Res., and 148 men. Both Lieut. Fletcher and Lieut. Carl will remain with the company but Dr. Searight, who had served as train surgeon, will return to the eighth corps area.

First Lieut. Robert W. King, PA-Res., who has been on duty at Prescott, will serve with the new company while Dr. Elias H. Porter, Medford, will remain as camp surgeon.

The new Prescott company was complimented by headquarters officers on their neat and orderly appearance upon arrival here. Their special train was one of the cleanest and neatest to arrive, everything being in ship-shape order. If the company lives up to its first impressions, it will make a strong bid for the Medford district flag won by the old Prescott company for the past two months.

A special train carrying the men of the old Prescott outfit left Medford Friday. With them were all six corps area men from headquarters detachment, and South Fork, and men being discharged from Sitkum and McKinley camps.

Several new companies are expected to arrive here during the next few days. Co. 3865 will arrive from Texas today at 1:20 p. m. to occupy the South Fork camp and on Monday two companies will arrive at Coquille for Sitkum and McKinley. On Wednesday a company will arrive at Grants Pass and another will arrive at Klamath Falls for Camp Lake.

A company for Coos Head will arrive at Marshfield Thursday; one for Oregon Caves will arrive on the same day at Grants Pass; and one for Silver Lake will arrive in eastern Oregon.

Capt. Glenn J. Key, who took a fifth corps area troop train east two weeks ago, returned to Medford Saturday after bringing back replacements for fifth corps areas in this district. He had been to Fort Knox, Kentucky.

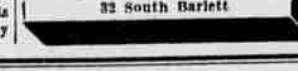

TRAVEL GAINS IN NATIONAL PARKS

WASHINGTON, Oct. 10.—(P)—The national park service reported today travel into the government's scenic and historical preserves hit a new high during the 1936 travel season ended September 30.

The official compilation of attendance figures for the season showed 9,292,423 persons, or one-fourteenth of the total population, visited the 134 national parks and monuments, compared with 7,675,000 last year, highest previous mark, and 3,619,000 in 1931.

Comparative 1935 and 1936 totals for national parks included Crater Lake, Ore., 107,701 and 180,382.

POTATO FUTURES HIT YEAR'S PEAK

CHICAGO, Oct. 10.—(AP)—Potato futures, quoted from \$2.16 to \$2.92 per hundred pounds, were the highest of the year today.

Advancing 1 to 2 cents on top of yesterday's 10 to 25 cents upturn, Idaho Russets deliverable on the mercantile exchange before the close of the month sold as high as \$2.18 per cwt. and closed at \$2.16, January and March contracts closed at \$2.60 and \$2.92 respectively.

The hint from the White House that Mr. Roosevelt will seek continuance of his devaluing powers was an advance feeler for a foregone conclusion. Until a definite and permanent stabilization can be effected, there is no other way to safeguard the dollar against excessive foreign devaluations.

Klamath Dairy Held Pure Food Violator

SEATTLE, Wash., Oct. 10.—(AP)—John L. Harvey, chief of the Seattle station of the pure food and drug administration, said today an action against the Lost River dairy of Klamath Falls, Ore., had been filed in federal district court at Portland.

The action charges the shipment of illegal butter in interstate commerce, he said.

He said the case was "one of a number of such prosecutions" the administration is carrying on over the northwest.

MADRID DEFENSE FORCES BACK UP

MADRID, Oct. 10.—(UP)—Loyalist forces, resisting a terrific insurgent drive in the Navalperez battlefield approximately 35 miles west of Madrid fought against superior odds today and slowly gave ground in hotly contested sectors.

H. T. Gorrell, United Press correspondent with the loyalists at La Navas Del Marques, a loyalist base east of Navalperez, reported by telephone that the rebels had captured El Hoyo De Pinares, eight miles south of Navalperez.

The fall of Caceres, 3 1/2 miles south of El Hoyo on the Navalperez-Madrid highway, was believed eminent. Although El Hoyo is a small village, its capture was of importance because it commands traffic from the rebel positions to the southwest both towards Las Navas and El Escorial, the latter about 20 miles from the capital and key to the main highway.

TYPHOON DELAYS 'CHINA CLIPPER'

BOARD CHINA CLIPPER, en Route to Wake Island, Oct. 11.—(Sunday)—(P)—A typhoon crossed the China Clipper's path today, precluding a possible layover at Wake Island while the storm blows itself out between Guam and the Philippines.

Pan American Airways flies its transpacific air liners according to weather maps, company meteorologists deciding upon routes to be followed between island stopping places.

(The hurricane struck the northern provinces of Luzon Island in the Philippines, killing at least three persons and injuring six. Moving toward the northwest, this storm crossed the path of the clippers northeast of Manila.)
