**Active Club Hears Indian Reservation Head at Meeting**

Wade Crawford, superintendent of the Klamath Indian reservation, was the main speaker at the active club meeting at Hotel Medford last night, telling the Actvians of the management of the reservation.

Crawford said that the Klamath Indians are the second wealthiest tribe in the United States, because of their valuable timber holdings. The Osege Indians he ranked first, by virtue of the oil found on their lands. The timber on the Klamath reservation is patrolled for fires by an efficient organization and an average of 135 fires annually have failed to cause serious loss, he said. The Indians themselves have a large hand in the management of the reservation, Crawford said.

Entertainment was furnished by Cecil Schmorl's Pine Cone orchestra, received very favorably in the Actvians. Guests at the meeting included E. H. Loose, transferred here from Portland by the Shell Oil company, Capt. Harry Ashe, chief pilot for Major Max Fleischmann who flew here from Santa Barbara, California, in three hours yesterday, and Carl Johnson, west member of the Medford Active club who has been living in Kansas.

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**STATE CONVENTION OF CHURCH GROUP IS STARTED HERE**

Opening Sessions Are Held By Women's Synodical Society With Presbyterian Leaders In Attendance.

As delegates continued to arrive, the opening sessions of the three-day 18th annual state convention of the Women's Synodical society of the First Presbyterian church got under way this morning at the church here, under the leadership of Mrs. Douglas I. Bates of Portland, state president.

A preliminary count this morning showed about 50 delegates from eastern and northern Oregon, with many more expected to arrive today from Roseburg, Ashland, Klamath Falls, Grants Pass and other southern Oregon towns. The total number of out-of-town delegates is expected to reach well over 100.

Morning hours today were taken up with an executive meeting to plan business matters to come before the conference. From 1:30 to 3:30 o'clock this afternoon Mrs. J. McCormick of Corvallis conducted a leadership training conference which was followed by further leader discussions.

Principal event on today's program will be the youth leader's forum to be conducted this evening in the church auditorium. Presiding will be the Rev. H. B. MacFadden, assistant pastor of the First Presbyterian church in Portland, who has had charge of a number of education projects there. Also speaking at tonight's forum will be Mrs. Louis Parsons of Portland.

As many of the speakers to appear before the conclave sessions are of national reputation and have selected topics of general interest, many non-members are expected to attend. Chief among the speakers is Dr. Paul Dolts who is associated with Silliman university in the Philippine islands and who is to address the assembly tomorrow night.

# RESERVATION HEAD TELLS ACTIVITIES AT ROTARY LUNCH

Wade Crawford, superintendent of the Klamath Indian reservation, presented some interesting facts concerning the activities and scope of Indian administration as a feature of Tuesday's luncheon meeting of the Medford Rotary club. Mr. Crawford told the Rotarians and guests assembled at the Hotel Medford, that the Klamath reservation, established in 1864 with three tribes now has representatives of 64 Indian tribes. The reservation is approximately 50 miles square with over a million acres of land, a large portion of which is in virgin timber. Three billion, five hundred million feet of timber, including one of the world's finest stands of yellow pine, are on the reservation, Crawford said, with cutting on a sustained-yield basis of approximately a million feet a day.

The south slopes are more affected by pine beetle, the speaker said, which means that the best timber on the reservation is found on the north slopes. The Indians are engaged mainly in farming, cattle raising and lumbering and, with six irrigation projects on the Indian lands, there is an abundance of water.
