1800 made in Klamath county. Altogether, the republicans registered gains in 22 counties and losses in 13. The largest losses, besides Multnomah, were 796 in Coos, 558 in Malheur, and 256 in Tillamook, while besides Klamath, the largest gains were recorded in Linn, 981; Clackamas, 732; Washington, 552; Baker, 528, and Douglas, 526.

Evincing an interest in the coming elections that promises to exceed that shown in the past several years, Phoenix citizens met at the city hall last night to nominate new city officials. W. D. Barnes, present mayor, declined to accept the re-nomination tendered him, and L. E. Stennett and W. D. Steadman will seek the office. Stennett is at present councilman for the first ward.

Mrs. Nell V. Barnes was nominated as treasurer and Mrs. Inis P. Turpin and V. R. Hallcraft accepted nominations for recorder. Two councilmen from each of the first, second and third wards will be elected from the following nominees: First — J. W. Watkins, C. T. Pipes (incumbent) and P. E. Hallgren; second — D. O. Modrell, Jess Reynolds, and Rob. Furry and Bert Stanchiff, incumbents; third — W. King, C. E. Stockwell, Guy Cobbleth and John E. Roberts, the latter two now holding the offices. Bert Stanchiff acted as chairman of the meeting.

RAILROAD FREIGHT SIX YEAR RECORD

WASHINGTON, Oct. 16.—(AP)—American railroads carried more freight during the week ended Oct. 10 than at any time in almost six years.

The Association of American Railroads reported today that \$20,023 cars were loaded during the week ended last Saturday. This was the largest quantity since the week ended Nov. 8, 1930, when 829,023 cars were loaded.

The loadings reported today an increase of 1,080 cars, or .01 per cent, compared with the preceding week; an increase of 85,041, or 11.7 per cent, compared with a year ago, and an increase of 183,196, or 28.8 per cent, compared with two years ago.
