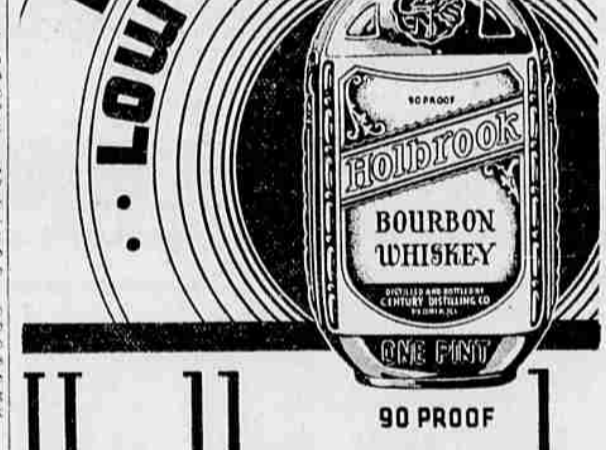
Five thousand four hundred and eighty-three Republicans and 2883 Democrats registered in Jackson county.
