

GIRL MOTHER SLEW ILLEGITIMATE CHILD IS JURY'S VERDICT

NEW YORK, Oct. 16.—(AP) Elizabeth Smith, pale and shaken, awaited in a jail cell today her call to court October 23 for sentence on a second degree manslaughter conviction in the slaying of her illegitimate son.

A jury of 12 men convicted her last night.

The girl, who will be 19 next month, stood stunned as the verdict was announced. Then she shrieked, moaned and crumpled in a faint.

Edward Bianco, defense counsel, said there will be an appeal "if I have to pay for it myself."

The verdict carries a maximum prison term of 15 years.

The prosecution did not insist on the death penalty, asking only a conviction that would be both "merciful and just."

The state contended that Miss Smith deliberately threw the baby to a concrete araway a few hours after she delivered the child unaided in the bathroom of her home. The defense held that pain and terror robbed her of control of her actions, that she fainted on the roof and the infant rolled from her arms.

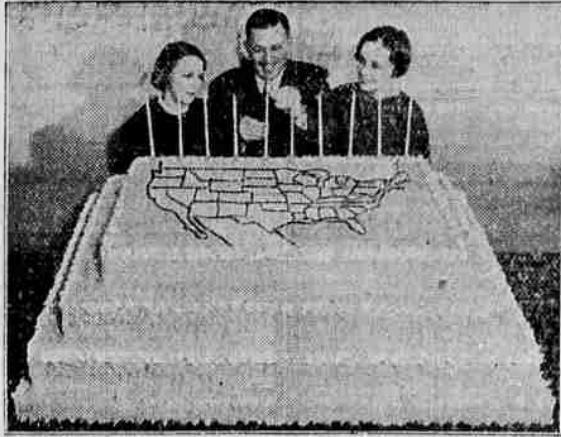
FARMER SEES SNAKES WHILE CHOPPING TREE

co-op leaders are coming around to the conclusion that a centralized national bureaucratic system of consumer co-ops is an entirely different thing from what they have been working for. The theory is developing among them that the co-op system must work up on a sound economic basis and not be handed down by decree. For one thing, people must be trained to handle the system; for another, there is the farm price question.

Nevertheless, public agitation is being continued by Edward A. Flynn, the Boston department store friend of Mr. Roosevelt, who is the man behind

New Deal interest in the subject.

The tenth biennial congress of the Co-operative League did not get much public attention at Columbus, Ohio, last week, but it went on record in favor of federal aid to consumer co-ops.

What will happen after election is yet to be decided.

Another claim for the new three-power money arrangement is that it will stop speculation in foreign exchange. It will not do that either. Most of the technical opportunities for speculation which existed before are still open. There is a free gold market in London. The old gold shipping arrangements remain in effect. The dollar, pound and franc will fluctuate daily.

The main difference is that the three nations hope to hold the fluctuations of the franc within the narrow range in which they have held the pound and the dollar for more than a year now. They may or may not be successful in the course of coming months.

RECIPE

2/3 cup shortening 3 cups IGA Cake Flour
2 cups sifted sugar 4 teaspoons baking powder
4 eggs 1 teaspoon IGA Soda
1-3/4 cups sour milk 1 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon IGA Vanilla 4 squares IGA Chocolate

Cream shortening until soft, sift in sugar gradually and cream together thoroughly. Add eggs, one at a time and mix well. Add sifted flour alternately with sour milk which has been beaten or stirred until smooth. Add melted chocolate and stir until well mixed. Dissolve soda in one tablespoon cold water and add. Mix well. Sift baking powder into butter and mix again. Pour into four well-greased 10-inch layer cake pans. Bake for 20 minutes at 375° Fahrenheit. Use only one-half the recipe if preferred.

FROSTING

1/2 cup IGA Cocoa 1/3 cup butter
1/4 cup sugar 2-1/2 pounds confectioners' sugar
1/2 teaspoon salt 1 teaspoon IGA Vanilla
1 cup water 1/4 teaspoon IGA Orange Extract

Sift sugar, cocoa, and salt together, boil for 3 minutes. Remove from stove, add butter, mix well, and sift powdered sugar into the mixture. Make consistency suitable to spread, add flavoring, then beat thoroughly until the sugar has lost its grain and tastes like a cooked frosting. Frosting may be thinned if necessary with a spoonful of honey or hot water. Spread frosting between layers and on cake. Press nut meats into the frosting.
