## LEWIS TO ENTER SATURDAY GAME IF MEDIC ALLOWS

Ray Lewis, injured left halfback of the Medford Black Tornado, who has been out of action since a twisted ankle sent him from the Eureka game three weeks ago, may see action against Granta Pass in what looks like the game to decide the southern Oregon conference winner, Coach Bill Bowerman admitted today.

In scrimmage last night Lewis galloped through his plays with almost a complete lack of limp, although he was favoring the injured member.

Bowerman said he may use Lewis if the going gets rough in the Cavenham struggle, but that he would definitely not start him. If a doctor gives Lewis an OK on the foot he will see some action, otherwise he will be saved for the Klamath Falls clash on the following week.

Last night Bowerman believed he had solved the defect in pass defense that plagued the Tigers in the Marshfield game. "On Tuesday night the second team completed an alarming number of passes on the varsity but last night they completed only one," Bowerman said. Attention will now be paid to solving the Granta Pass running attack, with the second team going through the Cavenham formation.

Asked how he regarded the coming struggle, Bowerman said: "It will undoubtedly be the toughest football game we'll have this year. Granta Pass is good, and they know they're good. They're coming primed to take us, and take us hard, and I look for a plenty tough afternoon."

Bowerman said he would decide whether to run in the second team as a distinct entity instead of substituting man-for-man only after he watches the second team in action tonight. The reserves have a polished offensive but have been weak on defense. If they show to good ability on defense today they will probably all see action against the Cavenham, Bowerman said.

## Poll of Editors Points To Roosevelt's Election

NEW YORK, Oct. 22.—(SpI)—Franklin D. Roosevelt will most likely be re-elected to the presidency, according to results of the third annual political poll taken among 3,145 newspaper editors by Liberty Magazine.

Liberty asked each editor who he thought would be elected president. About 400 editors turned this question down, leaving some 4,600 lined up as follows:

Franklin D. Roosevelt..... 2,875  
Alfred M. Landon..... 1,814  
William Lenke..... 18  
Norman Thomas..... 0  
Earl Browder..... 0

The editors predicted as follows:

1. That Mr. Roosevelt will receive a minimum of 269 electoral votes—three more than he needs to win, and a number that may be increased by Roosevelt victories in any one of four doubtful states.
2. The Democrats will win 266 seats in the house of representatives to 199 for the Republicans, 7 for the Progressives, and 3 for the Farmer-Laborites.
3. The Democrats will win 20 of the fall's 36 senatorial elections—giving them 67 seats in the senate to 27 for the Republicans and one each for the Progressive and Farmer-Labor parties.

## G. PASS JUNIORS HERE SATURDAY

The Medford Junior high Bulldogs will tangle with the Granta Pass Juniors on Van Scoyoc field here Saturday morning at 10 o'clock in the second game of the year between the two squads. Medford eked out a 6-0 win over the Cave-children three weeks ago, but are not overconfident of repeating the performance.

Last week the Granta Pass squad downed the Ashland Juniors 13-0, the same score by which Medford won over Ashland, indicating the Climate City outfit has materially improved since the game with the Bulldogs.

Last night Coach Acheson's Medford team scrimmaged against the St. Mary's high alumni in a practice game and the coach stated that the blocking and tackling of his men was the best of the year.

Acheson will start Newton at center, Hibbert and Lewis at guards, Howard and Raymond at tackles, Wylie and L. Thurman at ends, H. Thurman at quarterback, Crosby and Stead at halves and Newland at full. There will be a small admission price for the game.

## STEELE WINS DECISION OVER ALLEN MATHEWS

SEATTLE, Oct. 22.—(AP)—Tossing another challenger out on his ear, Champion Freddie Steele of Tacoma had his middleweight headquarters in shipshape today as he prepared to leave on an invasion of the south and east.

In a sensational 10-round, non-title battle here last night, Steele knocked down Allen Mathews, touted St. Louis negro, for an eight count to win the unanimous decision of the two judges and referee. Steele weighed 158½ and Mathews 162.

"That boy's a real champion," was Mathews' only comment. "And that was my toughest fight," said the champion.

## C. P. SAINTS TILT CLAIMS INTEREST

Much interest is being manifested in the St. Mary's of Medford and the Central Point high schools over their impending football clash on Van Scoyoc field tomorrow afternoon at 3:45 o'clock. The game will be the second of the year for each team. The Pointers having downed the Ashland Juniors and St. Mary's having fallen victim to a Medford Junior attack last week.

The battle will be the first between the two schools. Both are playing organized football for the first time this year, and while the play of both teams is ragged, the two squads are believed of about the same strength. The Pointers will outweigh the Saints by many pounds to the man. Coach Ken Hulbert of Central Point said yesterday he could put a team on the field that would average 160 pounds per man, but that his starting lineup weighs considerably less than that.

Coach Wally Rickett's Saints have a backfield averaging under 100 pounds, with the two heaviest men on the squad weighing 140 each. They are Schade, fullback, and Mikache, tackle.

Morgan, a stocky, slam-bang glove thrower, has more experience than the rangy Emders, but the aggressive ring work of the Klamath pride has made him a crowd pleaser in many coast cities.

Lillard announced that if the boxing card proves a success it is likely that boxing will supplant wrestling for the remainder of the winter season, or at least until after Christmas.
