DRIVERS WARNED OF FEW DRINKS; AIDS ARE GIVEN

TUSCALOOSA, Ala. (AP)—America's greatest highway menace are drivers who have had a few cocktails and highballs, but who are not intoxicated, according to Dr. Earle Harris, Birmingham, president emeritus of medicine at the University of Alabama.

Dr. Harris, speaking before the Southern Traffic Officers Training School at the university, based his opinion upon the statement that the bulk of traffic accidents occur just after "cocktail hour."

It also was pointed out that intoxicated drivers are noticed quicker and taken off the highways sooner than are drivers who have had only a few drinks.

Drivers with only a few drinks, Dr. Harris explained, are prone to take more chances than when not stimulated by alcohol.

Dr. Harris offered these health suggestions to aid drivers in preventing accidents:

- 1. If possible, never drive without having plenty of sleep—eight or nine hours.
2. Remedy late sleep by taking a cup of coffee or soft drink containing caffeine every three hours while driving.
3. Confine driving to six or eight hours during the 24 except in emergencies.
4. Driving efficiency is increased by three small daily meals—accompanied by between-meal snacks of fruit, milk or sandwich.

HIGH QUALITY OF ANCIENT CEMENT PUZZLES EXPERTS

TURIN, Italy (UP)—Large quantities of dynamite were used by a road construction corps here to demolish ancient Roman canal foundations reinforced with cement which experts say is far stronger than any produced by modern methods.

Stream drills were used without success to remove the canal foundations which obstructed construction of "Via Roma," in the heart of Turin. Following the use of dynamite, samples of the Roman cement were taken to laboratories for analysis in an effort to ascertain nature of the formula used in mixing.

Discovery of the canal foundations was accidental. While digging below the present street level, workmen suddenly struck a deep vein of thin river sand. Experts were called to the scene. On investigation, it was found that the sand had the same characteristics as that along the banks of the River Sangone, seven miles from Turin.

Excavation of ancient Roman architecture is now proceeding through Italy, having been encouraged by the Fascist government.
