RIGID PUNISHMENT IS ADVOCATED FOR KID EXTORTIONISTS

G-Men's Head Says Young Extortionists Can Cause As Much Grief As Kidnaping—Talk Insufficient

WASHINGTON, Oct. 23.—(AP)—Severe punishment, promptly administered, was recommended today by J. Edgar Hoover, director of the federal bureau of investigation, as "good medicine" for youthful extortionists. Hoover, who previously has advocated "better understanding" between police departments and young boys, said that extortion "is much too serious a crime to be passed over lightly."

"One of the greatest menaces in the current national crime picture," he said in an interview, "is the youthful extortionist. He should be prosecuted and made an example of not be treated as a prankster."

"Receipt of an extortion note can cause almost as much grief and distress in a family as kidnaping. Families are agonized by extortion letters, for they cannot be sure the threats won't be carried out, nor can they tell what form of tragedy is impending."

"Youthful extortionists should not be condoned," he continued feelingly. "They should be punished promptly and severely like any other criminal, not let off with a parental lecture or easy discipline."

One of the most recent extortion attempts in justice department files was directed against Shirley Temple Hollywood's juvenile star. An extortion letter demanded \$25,000 from "Mrs. Shirley Temple" if she wanted "to keep Shirley." G-men said they traced the letter to a mid-manned, 16-year-old school boy in Atlanta, Ga.

Hoover, in a recent address at New York City, said seven hundred thousand boys and girls were enrolled in a vast army of criminals.

TRAFFIC DEATHS GAIN IN OREGON

SALEM, Oct. 23.—(AP)—Traffic fatalities during September this year showed a 25 percent increase over the same month a year ago. The 30 deaths brought the year's toll to 218, compared to 185 for the same period in 1935.

The number of persons injured and the total accidents reported showed an even higher percentage the past month; the secretary of state announced today. Injuries were 703 compared to 458, and accidents were 3,152 compared to 1,900.

Thirteen of the September fatalities were pedestrians. The other deaths were caused as follows: Automobile with a fixed object 4, motorcycle with a fixed object 4, motorcycle and non-collision accidents 3 each, not stated 2.

Seven of the deaths occurred in Multnomah county, five in Klamath county, four in Jackson county, two

each in Coos and Tillamook counties, and one each in Clackamas, Crook, Deschutes, Douglas, Lane, Lincoln, Marion, Umatilla, Wasco and Yamhill.

RELIGIOUS SCRUPLES NO FARM BENEFIT BAR

WASHINGTON, Oct. 23.—(AP)—Because some farmers have "religious and moral" scruples against signing an application for farm benefit payments, AAA officials said today that special provisions had been made to enable them to qualify for a share of the \$470,000,000 to be distributed this year.

Secretary Wallace recently approved a special order for these payments. Under it, the county AAA committees may certify payment applications without signature by typing the name of the farmer and adding "unsigned—religious scruples."

The farmer must appear, however, and orally affirm that the application is correct.

LEGISLATORS COMFORT HELPS TAX COIN WASTE

OMAHA, Neb., Oct. 23.—(AP)—The way to trim governmental costs, said State Representative W. F. Haycock,

is to take some of the comfort out of law making. Accordingly he proposed the removal of seats from the legislative chamber, forcing members to work standing up. "This will promote short sessions as only those devoted to duty would stick to the job," he averred.

LENIENCY ASKED FOR PICK-HANDLE SLAYER

OGDEN, Utah, Oct. 23.—(AP)—George Mortensen was convicted today of first degree murder in the pick-handle slaying last June 30 of his father-in-law, Adam Snyder.

A verdict of guilty carried a recommendation of leniency. Mortensen also was accused of slaying his mother-in-law, Mrs. Mable Scott Snyder, and his wife's aged grandmother, Mrs. Emma Scott Rose. Mortensen's attorneys pleaded insanity.

Bath Tub Fall Fatal PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 23.—(UP)—Thomas B. Smith, 52, who fractured a hip in a fall in the bathroom of his home October 17, died in Portland sanitarium today.

OREGON'S TAX SYSTEM SCARES HOMESEEEKERS

PORTLAND, Oct. 23.—(AP)—Home seekers coming to the Pacific northwest from the drought country steer clear of Oregon because of the tax system, said Fred C. McGowan, real estate appraiser.

Oregon, trailing Idaho and Washington in the number of settlers, places the tax burden on the farm and home, the realtor said.

He cited figures showing that of 8700 new farm families in the northwest, 4500 went to Idaho, 2300 to Washington and 1900 to Oregon.

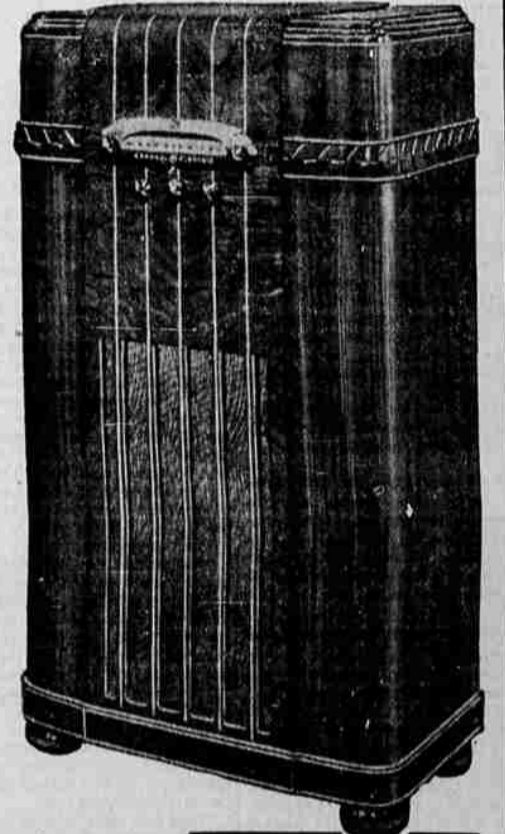
