Brown Soup Stock
2 1/2 lbs. beef shank
2 tablespoons fat
2 1/2 quarts cold water
1 1/2 teaspoons salt
3 whole cloves
3 sprigs parsley
1/2 cup carrot (cut in small pieces)
1/2 cup onion (cut in small pieces)
1/2 cup celery (cut in small pieces)
1 bay leaf
3 whole cloves

Remove meat from bone and cut in small cubes. Heat fat in hot frying pan, add meat and brown lightly. Crack soup bone in several places, and place in Thrift Cooker kettle. Add cold water, browned meat, seasonings and vegetables. Cover. Cook on Low heat 5 to 6 hours, strain carefully; chill and skim off fat.

Onion Soup
6 small onions (sliced thin)
3 tablespoons salt and pepper butter
Place sliced onions in saucepan. Cook on High heat 10 minutes, and Low heat 10 minutes. Combine with soup stock in Thrift Cooker kettle; add seasonings and heat on High heat until soup is very hot. Serve with toasted bread slices or croutons and grated parmesan cheese.

AMENDMENT FOR ADVERTISING ACT TO BE ON BALLOT

Proponents Claim Present Law Fostered By Selfish Group—Foes Vision Return Of Vicious Practices.

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 23.—(AP)—The state legislature in 1933 passed a law, better known as the dentist's advertising act, which forbids dentists from advertising prices. The initiative measure on advertising to be voted on November 3, would nullify, by constitutional amendment, this act as well as forbid regulation of any truthful advertising within the state.

In sponsoring the amendment to the constitution, S. T. Donohue, Eugene, declared a favorable vote on the bill would protect all lines of lawful business from legislative restriction placed on them by small groups banded together to promote their own selfish interests at the expense of honest competition. Proponents of the amendment further state the dental law was not designed for the general public, since it does not prohibit lowering of prices or giving free dental examinations. They state further that the act affecting dentists only "is the opening

gun in a campaign to cripple every line of business that advertises price and quality."
Opponents of the amendment are headed by the Portland better business bureau and by numerous chambers of commerce, who state in their arguments that if the amendment were passed many "vicious practices long outlawed, could again be exploited."

Those opposed to the amendment state the favorable passage would open the way for advertising various "crimes of lust, repeal of various vegetable grading and label laws, and

would lift the safeguards from all types of consumers."
The dental advertising statute itself has been tried in the state supreme court and found constitutional.
