

FOREST RECEIPTS SHOW LARGE GAIN

WASHINGTON, Oct. 23.—(AP)—The agriculture department reported receipts from national forests for the past fiscal year amounted to \$4,062,953, a gain of \$774,363 over the previous year.

About half of the income was from timber sales. Grazing fees for livestock aggregated \$1,443,718. Rentals from summer home sites, hotels, concession stands and other specialized uses amounted to \$327,092.

The forest service said 25 per cent of all receipts were turned over to individual states to go to counties in which the national forests are located, in lieu of taxes for road and school purposes. Another 10 per cent is used for road building in the federal forest reservations.

PRISONER TRANSFER RIGHT CHALLENGED

SALEM, Oct. 23.—(AP)—Governor Martin's right to transfer penitentiary prisoners sentenced to terms of less than one year back to the county jails was challenged in a habeas corpus proceeding filed here by one of the Marion county prisoners transferred.

Attorneys for William H. Aldrich, sentenced to six months for larceny by bailie, obtained the signature of Circuit Judge L. H. McMahan to the writ against Sheriff A. C. Burk to appear October 28 to show cause why the prisoner should not be released on the grounds the action of the governor was illegal.

WIFE OF RAIL HEAD IS TAKEN BY DEATH

CHICAGO, Oct. 23.—(AP)—Mrs. Hale Holden, wife of the chairman of the Southern Pacific railroad, died at her home here yesterday after several years of ill health.

The former Eleanor Weston of Dalton, Mass., Mrs. Holden was well known in Pasadena, Calif., and New York.

Besides her husband, she is survived by two sons, Hale Holden, Jr., and Philip Holden, and a daughter, Mrs. W. Scott Linn.

Baby Crying Due After Operation

PITTSBURGH, Oct. 23.—(AP)—The baby who never cries is going to raise a husky rumpus—and lose its unwelecome title.

Surgeons said today operations to remove an obstruction in the throat of 13-month-old Eugene Gregor have been successful.

Eugene's mother, Mrs. Otto Gregor, sought surgical aid, saying "I felt funny because he never cried." Eugene couldn't. The obstruction had nearly closed his larynx, making utterance of any sounds impossible.
