NEUTRAL RIGHTS ADHERENCE HELD NEED OF AMERICA

New Deal Stand on Ethiopian Sanctions Scored—Indiana Throng Tender Ovation to Kansan

INDIANAPOLIS, Oct. 24.—(AP)—Gov. Alf M. Landon advocated reliance upon neutral rights as "one of the great hopes" for keeping America out of foreign war tonight in presenting a dual program designed to avert conflict and bolster world peace.
