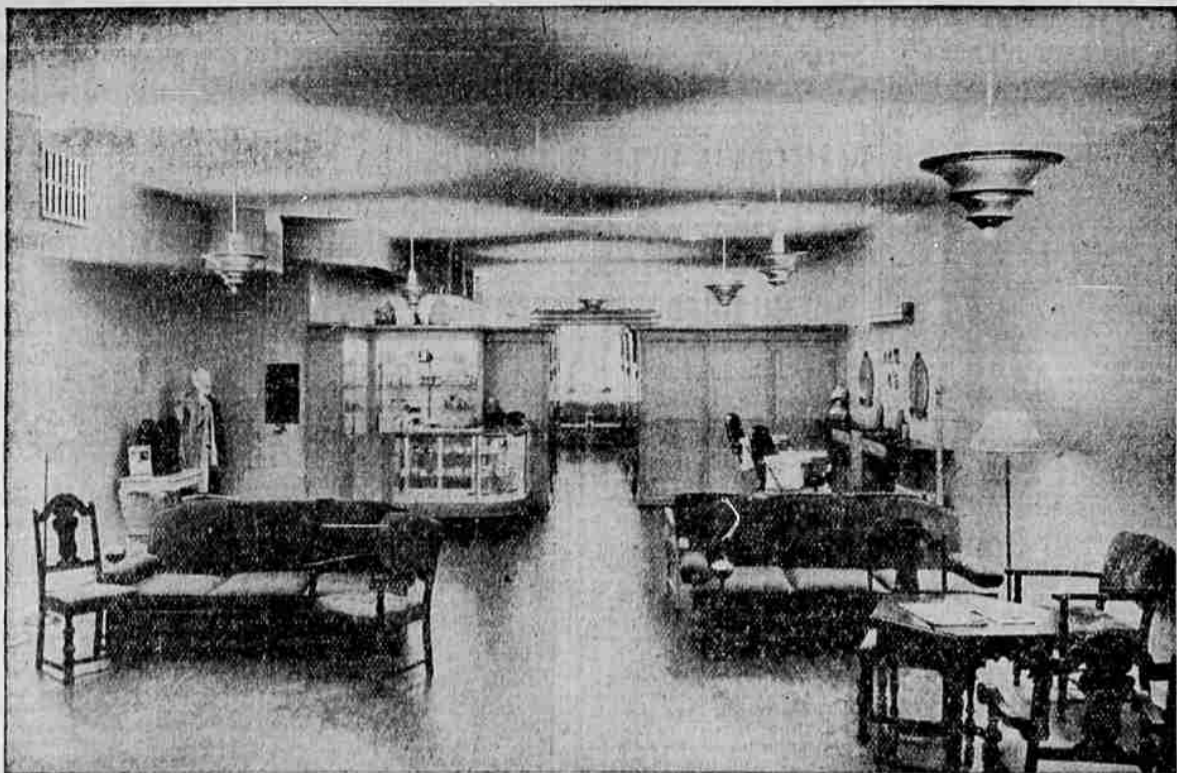


Mann's Remodeled Beauty Salon To Open Monday

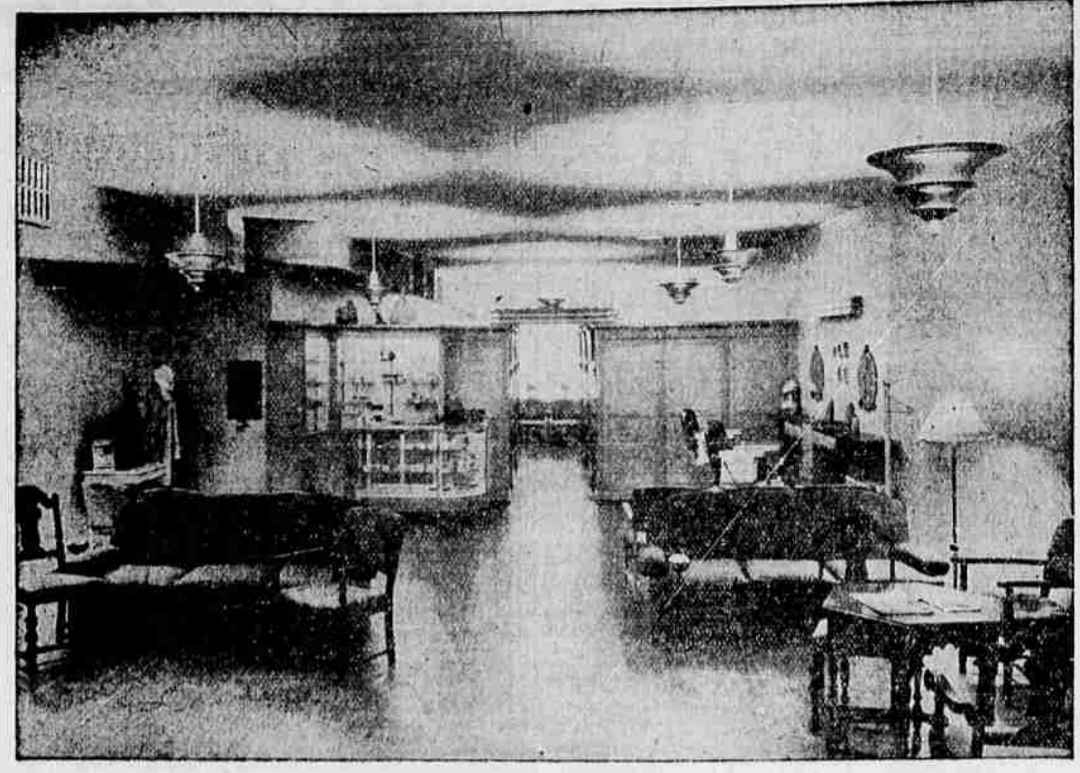

LANDON AHEAD IN 32 STATES, SEMI-FINAL TABULATION

Landon leads Roosevelt by nearly 11 to 8 in the semifinal returns of The Literary Digest's nationwide poll even though the president cuts into the Kansas governor's plurality for the seventh consecutive time due to the addition of approximately 125,000 poll ballots from metropolitan centers out of a total increase of 345,000 votes since last week's report.

Landon has a poll majority or plurality in thirty-two states while Roosevelt is shown carrying sixteen. In the electoral college these states would divide 870 votes for Governor Landon to 161 for President Roosevelt.

A total of 2,158,739 votes is reported in the current poll tally. The republican candidate gets 1,182,307 votes to the democrat's 878,526 and the union candidate's total of 75,119. The balance of 22,787 votes, or slightly over 1 per cent, is divided among the four minor candidates.

Lemke receives his largest state vote in his home ballwick of North Dakota where he is shown receiving a little over 12 per cent of the total vote there.

In Minnesota he receives slightly under 10 per cent of the state's vote and in all other states he is indicated receiving less.

A special polling of Chicago gives Roosevelt 16,234 votes out of a total city tally of 35,617 to Landon's 16,203 and Lemke's 1,335, indicating a scant plurality for the president in the Illinois metropolis.

In Philadelphia, Roosevelt is shown with 29,509 votes to Landon's 23,464 and Lemke's 2615 out of 56,327 ballots reported from the Quaker city.

Pittsburgh, where special treatment was given also by The Literary Digest poll managers, gives Roosevelt 9866 votes to date against receipts of 7005 ballots marked for Landon and 1240 for Lemke out of a total of 18,421.

Cleveland is reported balloting 2063 for the democratic candidate to the republican's 1025 and the union party nominee's 412.

New York City is reported returning 130,158 straw ballots in far which are divided 83,500 for Roosevelt, 42,069 for Landon, 5872 for Lemke and 4631 for others.

All of the returns from the several metropolitan cities are reported as included in the returns for the states of which they are a unit.

Landon shows a decrease percentage-wise in twenty-five states since

last week's tabulation, an increase in twenty states and no change in three states. Only in Illinois and New York, where a heavy metropolitan vote is reported, does his standing decline substantially.

MATELDA ADKINS PIONEER WOMAN, TO LAST REWARD

Mrs. Matilda J. Adkins, long-time pioneer resident of Medford, passed away Friday morning at the home of her niece, Mrs. George E. Houck, in Roseburg. She was the widow of Dr. B. F. Adkins, who died in May, 1919. Since her husband's death, Mrs. Adkins has divided her time between Medford and Roseburg. During their residence here, Dr. and Mrs. Adkins were among the most prominent citizens in the valley.

Matilda J. Howard was born in Putnam county, Indiana, in 1851 and died at the age of 83 years. She was united in marriage to Dr. B. F. Adkins in 1868 and with their daughters came to Medford in 1876, when the city was in the earliest stages of development.

For many years, she and her husband were prominent workers in the local Baptist church, having been among its founders. She was also an earnest worker in the Women's Christian Temperance Union and was the last surviving charter member of the Olive Rebekah lodge, No. 28.

Mrs. Adkins was a woman of fine Christian character, loved by all who knew her and with a friendly word for everybody. She leaves many friends who will be grieved at her passing. She is survived by one daughter, Mrs. Ora Barnett, of Alhambra, Calif., another daughter, Ada, having passed away several years ago; also one niece, Mrs. Edith Houck, of Roseburg, and several nephews, among them Leon O. and George W. Howard, of Medford.

Funeral services will be conducted from the Peet Funeral home Monday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock, with Rev. Daves, of the Baptist church, officiating.

Rebekah lodge will have charge of the services at the graveside. Interment will be in the I. O. O. F. cemetery beside her late husband.

SPARTA BUILDING NEAR COMPLETION

Renovation of the Sparta, Elliott and Childers buildings will be completed in the near future, it was learned today. The three buildings, which extend from Medford Domestic Laundry on North Riverside avenue to Bear creek along East Main street, are being modernized for store and professional offices.

The properties are owned by the Jackson Investment company, recently incorporated here with George A. Hunt as president, Roland Hubbard, vice president, and Al Littrell, secretary-treasurer.

Already several new tenants have taken space in the buildings and the premises are being prepared for additional occupants. Murray's beauty salon is one of the new tenants, having taken quarters on the East Main street ground floor of the Sparta building.

Under the articles of incorporation, the Jackson Investment company is given wide powers in the purchase, sale, ownership, leasing and operation of real and personal property and the erection, rebuilding, enlarging and improving of buildings of every

description. The company is capitalized at \$25,000.

LOCAL RESIDENT DIES ON JOURNEY

Herman P. Boyer, 62, of 821 West 12th street died of a heart attack while being brought to Ashland early yesterday morning for medical treatment.

Mr. Boyer had left Ashland for Klamath Falls with Delany Frost and K. E. Gale. He became ill near the summit of the Green Springs mountain. His friends then turned their automobile around and headed back toward Ashland to seek medical aid.

Mr. Boyer died before they reached the city. He was pronounced dead by Dr. E. G. Everett. The body was taken to the Peet mortuary.

Funeral arrangements were being held in abeyance last night pending the arrival of a son, Edgar Boyer, of Portland. Another son is in the Veterans' hospital in Napa, Wash. Mr. Boyer's wife died here three years ago.
