

Fred Astaire, Ginger Rogers In Craterian's "Swing Time" Showing

MUSIC, DANCING IN SPECTACULAR FILM OPENING RUN HERE

Whirling to new prestige in their sixth consecutive dancing triumph Fred Astaire and Ginger Rogers bring "Swing Time" to the screen of the Craterian theater, where it opens a three-day engagement today.

Presenting a new ballroom creation, the Swing Waltz, the two stars have been given numerous attraction qualities to make "Swing Time" their most entertaining film musical. The supporting cast includes Victor Moore, Helen Broderick, Eric Blore, Betty Furness and George Metaxa famous radio and stage star. Some of the most gorgeous settings ever shown on the screen form the colorful background for the action of the story.

Love affairs and complications feature the story plot, with Astaire endeavoring to rid himself of the haughty fiancée, Betty Furness, so that he can marry Miss Rogers, at the same time trying to discourage a glamorous orchestra leader, Metaxa, who also has matrimonial designs on Ginger.

Victor Moore and Helen Broderick are a pair of well-meaning but embarrassing matchmakers, who innocently provide many of the complications and much of the comedy. Eric Blore, the consulting butler of former Astaire-Rogers shows, is the owner of a dancing academy where Ginger is an instructor.

Jerome Kern's catchy melodies, of which there are six in the picture form the musical background for the team's five dance numbers, and for Astaire's sensational solo dance in blackface, "Bojangles in Harlem."

George Arliss Has Leading Part Show On Rialto's Screen

The Arliss gift for charming subtleties in the midst of double-dealing intrigue is given full display in "East Meets West," which heads the big double bill opening at the Rialto theater today for a three-day run. Here, again, is Arliss in bejeweled turbans and brocades, as colorful in costume as in character—and delightfully difficult to corner in a diplomatic tilt with words and wits.

The tropical country of Rungay is the setting for "East Meets West" and the story deals with the struggle between England and eastern powers to gain treaty rights to the harbor of Rungay. This port is ruled by a crafty and suave Rajah (Arliss), who sees a way to make both countries pay dearly for his signature on the dotted line, and in such a way that they will have no alternative except to keep the peace.

He is also engaged, as a sideline, in making beautiful women fall under his spell of the Orient, and in a cunning way manipulates them for himself.

Playing as the added feature on the same program is "Once to Every Bachelor," which stars Neil Hamilton and Marion Nixon. The story concerns the predicament of a New York playboy who contracts a "business" marriage in order to avoid having his income stopped and also to pacify an irate husband about to seek a divorce, naming him. The idea starts out swell—but the "business" bride becomes too lovely to keep the marriage on a business basis and then the fun starts.

Others in the cast are Raymond Hatton, William Austin and Aileen Pringle.
