The Girl Scout organization began in the United States 24 years ago, when Mrs. Low introduced it to 11 girls in Savannah, Ga. Since that beginning, membership has extended until at the present time it includes 383,000 active members and leaders. The local district is becoming more active each year and a large number of local mothers and patrons are engaged in leader and advisory activities.

## KLAMATH PAPERS IN FINE NEW HOME

**KLAMATH FALLS, Oct. 26.—(AP)—**A big, square brick building on the eastern fringe of the Klamath Falls business district sprang to new life today. For the first time in 20 years it was serving the purpose for which it was built—housing a newspaper plant.

The Evening Herald and the Klamath News, Klamath Falls' two dailies, took over the building, remodeled and re-equipped it and installed a new type heating system to overcome one of the structure's greatest problems.

The building was erected in 1912 to house The Northwestern, meteoric daily which rose and fell in three years.

Solution of the heating problem came with the development of natural hot water heat in certain sections of Klamath Falls. The old Northwestern building lies on the edge of the city's hot springs district. Last summer after one or two unsuccessful attempts, a well, bored deep, brought in water of almost boiling temperatures. Piped into the building, it heats the front office through standard radiators and the shop through a hot-air blower system.

## ROOSEVELT GIVEN 80,000 STATE WIN

President Roosevelt will carry Oregon by a margin of at least 80,000 votes, according to calculations of the Democratic state executive committee, it was stated today by A. E. Reames, committee member.

Mr. Reames attended a meeting of the committee in Portland Saturday when a whirlwind finish was mapped out for the campaign. Present were Claude McCulloch, state chairman, Howard Latourette, national committeeman, and the other nine members of the committee, Mr. Reames said.

Mr. Reames left here Saturday morning and returned Saturday night, traveling each way by plane.
