TURKEY CROP UP 15,000 THIS FALL

Turkey production this season in Jackson county will total 60,000 birds—approximately 15,000 more than last year—according to County Agent Hubert G. Fowler.

Largest flocks are reported in the Eagle Point, Applegate and Sams Valley districts.

The first pool sale of the valley turkey crop is scheduled for the middle of November.

Growers are now fattening the birds and placing them in condition for the Thanksgiving trade. Price of feed has risen, but the turkeys had fine forage all summer and fall.

No prices have yet been mentioned. The first buyers are expected to arrive early in November.

FRUIT SHIPMENTS FACE HANDICAP IN MARITIME STRIKE

Pacific for rail shipment to the Canadian port, the railroad granting a special rate of 16 1/2 cents per hundredweight above the rate to Portland.

Export through Westminster, however, would involve the additional cost of marketing which would have to be absorbed by the shippers, who in turn would be compelled to pass it on to the growers, it was said.

Like Portland, San Francisco is eliminated as an export port for duration of the strike.

Representatives of Medford shippers were in Portland today to attend tomorrow's meeting of the Oregon-Washington Pear bureau which, it was said, will undoubtedly discuss the strike situation.

Among those in Portland for the meeting were Gordon R. Green, division manager of American Fruit Growers, Inc.; Jack Spaulding, sales manager, and Shelby M. Tuttle, manager of Southern Oregon Sales, Inc.; and Raymond Reter, manager and vice-president of the Pinnacle Packing company. It was expected that Harry or David Rosenberg, proprietors of the Bear Creek orchard, also would attend the meeting.

Fearing a paralysis of marketing, the Rogue River Valley Traffic association some time ago sent urgent telegrams to President Roosevelt, the department of labor and senators and congressmen from Oregon asking that every possible step be taken to avert a shipping strike.

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 30.—(AP)—Strike paralysis gripped Portland's long Willamette river harbor today while officials of the National Longshoremen's association mapped plans for picketing and Gov. Charles Martin asserted at Marshfield:

"Threats of a sympathetic strike is the best news I have heard; that will end the picture quicker than anything else; England learned that years ago."

The governor referred to reports that east coast ports may be closed in connection with the strike called by the longshoremen of the Pacific coast ports after failure to reach an agreement with shipowners on working conditions.

SHIPPING STRIKE CLOSES SAWMILLS

LONGVIEW, Wash., Oct. 30.—(AP)—The Clark-Wilson sawmill at Prescott, Ore., eight miles up the Columbia river from here, will close down tonight because of the marine strike, company officials announced today. The plant employs 220 men.

The Dubois-Kittering mill at Rainier, Ore., employing 45 men, closed Tuesday night and will remain down until the strike is ended. Lumber for all orders at both mills has been cut and is on the docks ready for shipment, executives said, making further operations unnecessary at present.

The full force of the strike was not expected to fall on Longview's large mills, both the Long-Bell and Weyerhaeuser companies making a large share of their shipments by rail to the east and midwest.

FOREIGN SHIPS MAY TRANSPORT U. S. MAIL

WASHINGTON, Oct. 30.—(AP)—Creation of a federal system of bureaus for hiring of all seagoing personnel was proposed today by Joseph H. Weaver, director of the bureau of

marine inspection and navigation, as a solution of current maritime labor dispute.

While both President Roosevelt and the maritime commission gave direct study to the strike situation, the possibility arose that United States mail might be sent on foreign ships if American vessels were held up by the walkout.
