The place where Roberson had dragged himself from the water was located and grappling hooks brought up fishing tackle about 80 feet off...

Roberson at first believed that the boat had separated at the seams, but when the craft was recovered Friday night it was found intact. It was, however, a frail boat, about 12 feet long and a foot deep, and believed by those who saw it to be incapable of supporting three men in safety.

Cantrall, with his wife and friends, was fishing in the same boat last Sunday, and believed it to be safe, Roberson said. The men had no warning, the boat sinking out of sight in a matter of seconds, he said.

John Cantrall was born near Bush Ore., less than 20 miles from the scene of the tragedy, on March 11, 1888. He had fished for years at Squaw lake. For the past several years he had been manager of the Shell Oil company station at the corner of Jackson boulevard and Central avenue here.

For some time the young man had operated a delivery service in this city.

NEW COMPANY TO WORK COAL MINE

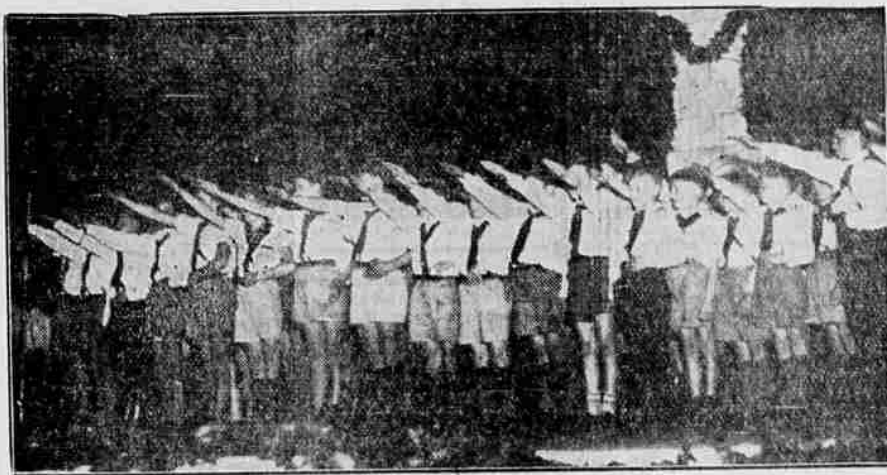
In the near future Medford will be able to boast of a high class producing coal mine. The holdings known as the Nelson lease, consisting of 780 acres, has been taken over by a new company.

SOUTH BEND, Ind., Oct. 31.—(UP)—Again rising to inspired heights against Ohio State, Notre Dame's gallant underdog team to a surprising second upset over the Buckeyes today, 7 to 2, before 55,000 drenched fans.

LANDON ASSERTS BROKEN PROMISES DELAY RECOVERY

A chorus of boos echoed virtually every mention of President Roosevelt and the New Deal. Hardly had the governor begun when voices began to shout: "Give it to 'em Alf!" and "Atta boy."

There was a constant interruption of applause bursts.

Landon closed his campaign for the White House by presenting a "choice."

"Let us," he said, "look forward to a great and happier America. An America with real recovery, with finances sound; with credit unquestioned."

"An America that sees its farmers free to plant what they want, raise what they will and with a market for their products."

"The two biggest jobs are wrapped together," the Kansas said. "We cannot live forever off tomorrow's income. We cannot live forever by borrowing from our children. And we cannot live forever a united nation with one fifth of our working population dependent upon the government."

For the spending "job," Landon promised a balanced budget. Then asked: "Why are there still 11,000,000 unemployed?"

"The answer is that enterprise and initiative are afraid of the present administration. They don't know what the administration is going to do next. They lack confidence in their own government and without this confidence they dare not plan for the future."

"If we are to have full recovery and reemployment, confidence must be restored. There must be some assurance that money invested today will not be destroyed tomorrow by an erratic administration."

Urges Confidence "We must restore confidence in the government's credit. But that is not all. We must also open the way to individual initiative. We must restore the principles of free competition. We must strengthen and en-

force the anti-trust laws which are designed for the protection of the little fellow. We must stamp out unfair trade practices which work to the disadvantage of the little fellow. And we must do this without treating every man who makes a profit as if he were a criminal against society."

"At the same time we must provide real old age pensions for our people. We must repeal the present tax on pay envelopes and pay the cost of these pensions as we go along by a direct tax widely distributed."

CAMPAIGN COSTS NEAR 11 MILLION

WASHINGTON, Oct. 31.—(AP) Expenditures of more than \$12,000,000 had been recorded today in America's costliest presidential campaign, as the Republican national committee's final report before election showed it had spent almost \$7,000,000.

Outstanding disbursements of \$1,302,068 in the ten days ended October 28 the Republican committee disclosed it had spent \$6,588,668 since January 1. Additional spending by congressional and senatorial committees boosted the party's total to \$7,488,718.

The combined outlay of the two major parties climbed close to \$11,000,000, as disbursements by Democratic organizations increased today to \$3,430,494. The Democratic national committee spent \$2,508,561, while the rest was paid out by congressional and senatorial committees.

War birds of the Spanish fascist forces bombed Madrid again last night (Saturday) while the toll of death from Friday's raids rose to 189. After two reconnoitering flights, the insurgent bombers flew over the capital twice as darkness fell, dropping projectiles which apparently caused no casualties.
