Tumult and Shouting Dies As Electorate Prepares for March to Polls—Record-Smashing Vote Looms

Rain in East. WASHINGTON, Nov. 2.—(AP)—The weather bureau today advised easterners to take an umbrella or raincoat along when they go to vote tomorrow.

By the Associated Press Across the vast expanse of America, the tumult over gigantic issues died away today as the nation's only sovereign—the voter—prepared to wield the scepter and decide tomorrow who shall head his government.

Record Vote Looms "Get out the vote," was the injunction heard on all sides. The efforts of the party workers, combined with the more-than-usual natural interest in the issues, still indicated a record-smashing vote, possibly 46,000,000, despite ominous word from the weather bureau that a cold rain or snow might blanket much of the United States on election day.
