

NANNY HONEYMAN SURPRISED, HAPPY

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 4.—(AP)—An almost constantly ringing telephone gave Oregon's first woman congressman-elect hardly time for her usual breakfast of lemon juice today but she and her family were still too happy over the election to find other than pleasure in the disturbance.

Mrs. Nanny Wood Honeyman, 55, a mother and grandmother, won election as U. S. representative from the third (Portland) Oregon district over the incumbent Republican—William E. Hall—and was she surprised?

"Yes, I really was," she said seriously on her way downstairs from her bedroom-office where she consented to pose for pictures almost before the remainder of Portland was awake. "It hardly seems real yet."

MRS. LUCKENBACH AWARDED DECREE

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 4.—(AP)—Mrs. Gladys Luckenbach was awarded a decree of separate maintenance today from her third husband, Lewis Luckenbach, steamship company official.

Mrs. Luckenbach sought \$1,000 a month separate maintenance for herself and their daughter. The court announced the case would be reopened to determine the amount of money Mrs. Luckenbach would receive.

Mrs. Luckenbach charged cruelty. She is Luckenbach's fourth wife.

TAXLESS NEVADA BROKER'S HAVEN

RENO, Nev., Nov. 4.—(AP)—Declaring Nevada is the nation's "only sound state," Julian T. Bishop, New York stock broker, said today that as a result of the reelection of President Roosevelt he would move to this state and dispose of his interests in the east, including a quail farm in North Carolina.

The broker, who has been living on a guest ranch here for some time with his wife, said he would make his home in Nevada because "the state's budget is balanced and there are no nuisance taxes."

He had previously declared he would move to Nevada in the event of a New Deal victory.

LANDON'S HOME COUNTY VOTES FOR ROOSEVELT

INDEPENDENCE, Kas., Nov. 4.—(AP)—Gov. Alf M. Landon carried his home town of Independence in Tuesday's election but on complete, unofficial returns trailed President Roosevelt in Montgomery county, which includes Independence.

Independence gave Landon 3409 votes and Roosevelt 2024. In the county the vote was Landon 11,393, Roosevelt 11,408.

STADELMAN WINS SEAT IN STATE LEGISLATURE

THE DALLIES, Nov. 4.—(AP)—P. J. Stadelman, former secretary of state, became state senator from Wasco and Hood River counties today and Malcolm Wilkinson, The Dalles, was Wasco county's new representative in the legislature, virtually complete check of returns revealed.

Stadelman was leading Francis Galloway, Democrat, by 300 votes in the district, although he ran only slightly ahead in his home county, Wasco.

WINNER OF ELECTION DIES FOLLOWING DAY

NORTH BEND, Nov. 4.—(AP)—Re-election yesterday; death today.

Dr. Russell Keizer, veteran leader in civic affairs, died this morning. He was renamed Coos county coroner at the general elections.

He died of a stroke.

Dr. Keizer was one of the founders of the Keizer hospital and served as an officer until his death.

FASCISTS PLANT GUNS ON WIDE MADRID FRONT

NAVALCARNERO, Spain, Nov. 4.—(AP)—Storming towards Madrid, fascists planted their guns along a new 10-mile front, 10 miles from the capital today.

The fascist high command stated that Madrid government militia again fired carefully constructed trenches as insurgent forces swept on through the newly captured towns of Mostoles, 10 miles south of Madrid, and Villavieja.

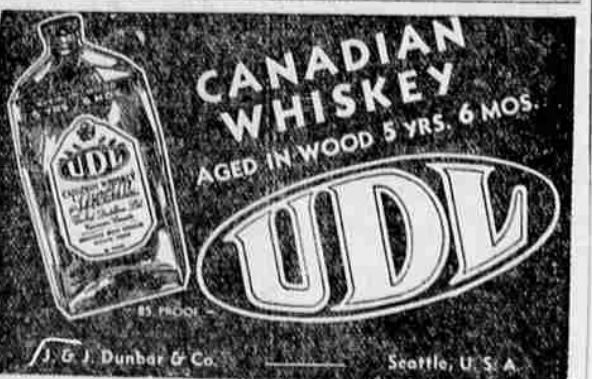

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ASHLAND PLACE LOSES LICENSE

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 4.—(AP)—The Oregon liquor control commission declined to compel the Speas Manufacturing company to raise its price of applejack or to bar it from the Oregon markets today. The action came on a petition filed by the Hood River Distillers, Inc., who claimed the Speas firm was selling its product below cost.

The Speas company contended it was competing with low-price whisky and that its price in Oregon was comparable with that in other states, freight rates considered.

One beer license was revoked, four were suspended and 11 denied. Denials included: Erica Meyers, Mammy's Cabin, Eugene; Frank Forth, Frenchy's Place, Ashland.

UNION PACIFIC TO SPEND 8 MILLION

OMAHA, Neb., Nov. 4.—(AP)—Union Pacific railroad headquarters here today announced expenditures of approximately \$8,000,000 in the belief a rapidly expanding freight and passenger traffic may be anticipated.

The announcement said the \$8,000,000 would be used for engines, new passenger cars, freight cars and modernizing of passenger cars.

A total of \$2,000,000 will go for new light weight trains, \$1,500,000 for modernizing of passenger cars in the shops here, with an estimated employment of 425.

The company will spend \$3,000,000 for 20 high speed combination freight and passenger engines from the American Locomotive company.

ONE GIRL SURVIVES IN QUADRUPLE BIRTH

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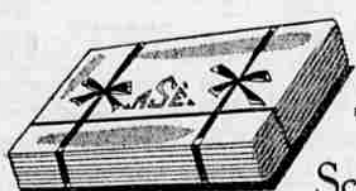
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
