NEW YORK, Nov. 4.—(AP)—Stock market industrialists went through the roof today in a post-election buying whirl that pushed many issues up 1 to 5 or more points to new highs for the recovery.

Only the utilities backed away as the Roosevelt victory, brokers said, caused some holders to unload on the theory further government regulation and rate cutting are in prospect. Transfers were around 3,000,000 shares.

It was the fastest in a month, with the ticker tape falling behind as much as four minutes at one time as blocks of several thousand shares changed hands.
