WASHINGTON, Nov. 5.—They talk of a new party. After every election, the experts always say, in the first flush of exciting post-election returns, that a thorough re-alignment of the old schools is in order.

Now, the avalanche is conjuring the idea that both parties are dead. The Rooseveltites are saying that the president, encouraged by his re-election, will go forward with a sweeping program. They say that NRA, AAA and all the other alphabetical agencies are child's play, as compared with what he intends to do.

The best judgment is President Roosevelt will not disturb any vital policy. He may annoy the disciples of private and public utility holding companies, and a few others, but the self-generative forces of business improvement, they say, will override any specific reforms that he has in mind.

LATE TABULATIONS PUT F. R. PLURALITY NEAR TEN MILLION

Democratic Grip On Both Houses of Congress Tightened—New Deal Leaders Formulate New Program

By the Associated Press. Still-accumulating election returns today pushed President Roosevelt's popular plurality toward ten millions, while, in and out of official life, Washington turned to mapping suggested paths for the New Deal to tread.

Tardy tabulations from hard-fought election districts showed that at least 333 Democrats would sit in the new house, as compared with 321 elected two years ago, and that the senate would include at least 73 Democrats where the party's membership in the last session was 69.

By the Associated Press. Beyond that, Democrats were leading as Iowa tellers neared the completion of their task of counting votes cast in two contests for senate seats in that state, holding out the probability the Democratic senate strength would be 75. Two house contests remained undecided.

\$125 RENTAL SET BY CITY COUNCIL FOR UNITED LINES

Present Figure Is Continued for 5 Years, Company to Provide Public Supplies—Engineer Is Employed

United Air Lines airport rental of \$125 a month for the next five years of a ten-year contract was approved by the city council last night upon recommendation of the aviation committee of which Fred Heath, Jr., is chairman. In addition, the company will pay \$5 monthly toward heating costs.

This is the same arrangement that has been in force during the first five years of the original ten-year contract. For the next five years, however, the company has agreed to furnish paper towels and other public supplies, these having been provided by the city to date.
