

RESIDENTS WATCH THRILLING COMBAT BETWEEN PLANES

(Continued from Page One.)

Insurgent ship caught fire a few seconds later.

Both fascist ships crashed to earth in a field north of Vallesca near the hamlet of Cristo de Ribas.

For the third successive day the wall of air raid sirens in the capital was almost ceaseless. Punctuated by the steady crash of artillery bombardments southwest of the city, the clamor sent residents scurrying to protection. Houses shook with the reverberating roar.

One of the fascist pilots escaped from his plunging plane and landed in a tree some distance from where the ship fell. He was sent to a hospital with a broken leg.

Plane Crew Killed.

The second insurgent fighting ship was reported to have burned with all its crew.

Fascist artillery laid down a barrage on government field headquarters a few miles south of Cerro de Los Angeles, famous landmark approximately 10 miles south of the city.

Squadrons of government bombing planes released a prolonged rain of high explosive bombs over Alcorcon county, west of Madrid.

Flocks of insurgent fighting ships dipped low over highways on the capital's outskirts, machine-gunning government reinforcements on their way to the front.

From the 13th floor of the Madrid telephone building, the smoldering ruins of Getafe, eight miles south of the city, could be seen. The bursting of insurgent shells near Carabanchel at 1:30 p. m. today showed the fascist artillery almost within range of the capital.

GIANNINI PLEASED BY VOTE RESULTS

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 5.—(AP)—A. P. Giannini, financier and ardent Roosevelt supporter, said today the presidential election suited him "fine and dandy."

Then, more soberly—"It was the best protection we could get against radicalism. We have a man at the helm who is sympathetic to the masses."

"He gives the workers hope for a sound program that is aimed to bring higher wages and a higher standard of living."

"For the farmers his election will also mean a higher standard of living—through higher prices for their products."

The founder of the Bank of America said the social security program is here to stay.

WOMAN KILLED BY TRAIN AT LELAND

GRANTS PASS, Nov. 5.—(AP)—Southern Pacific officials were advised this morning at 10:45 that a Mrs. Alderson had been killed near Leland, in northern Josephine county, by the northbound Shasta.

Hazel Snell was recently fatally injured in the Leland district when a car driven by her husband was struck by a train.

ELECTION BRINGS BIG WAGE BOOST

HOBBS, N. M., Nov. 5.—(AP)—Phil Gordon, owner of a large fleet of oil field trucks, announced in a newspaper advertisement today an increase of 20 per cent in wages to be paid his drivers.

"The United States," his advertisement said, "is headed for four of its most prosperous years and I want to start the ball rolling at home."

Hobbs is the center of the prosperous southeast New Mexico oil field, where Democratic candidates Tuesday received votes of approximately five to one and in some precincts of 20 or more to one.

Asserted Slayer Held In Portland

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 5.—(AP)—Captain of Detectives John J. Keegan said today a man giving the name of Clyde Donaldson had signed a confession to shooting a man named Smith or Schmidt in Minneapolis Oct. 27.

Donaldson was picked up by police here early today. Keegan said he admitted robberies of two cafes and the theft of a taxicab here and also several holdups and two automobile thefts in Seattle.

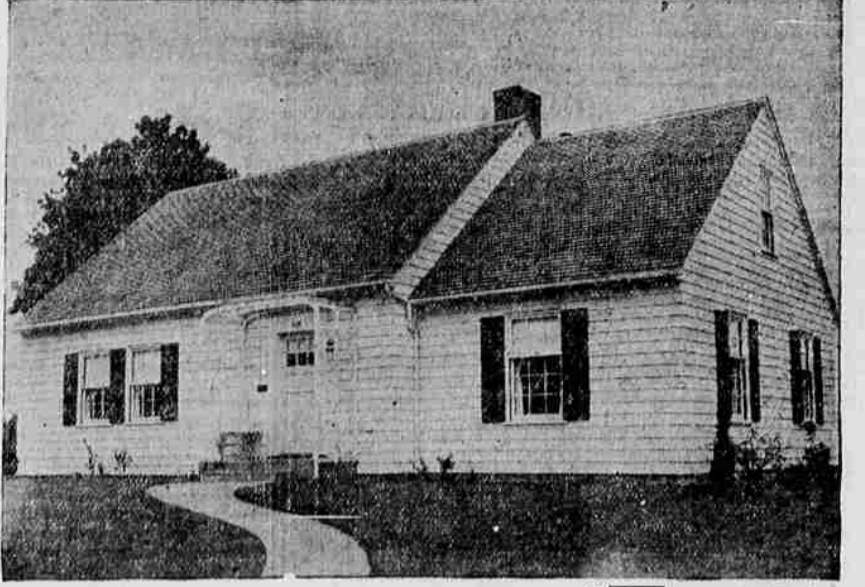

IN THE HEART OF THE CITY

Reminiscent of Cape Cod

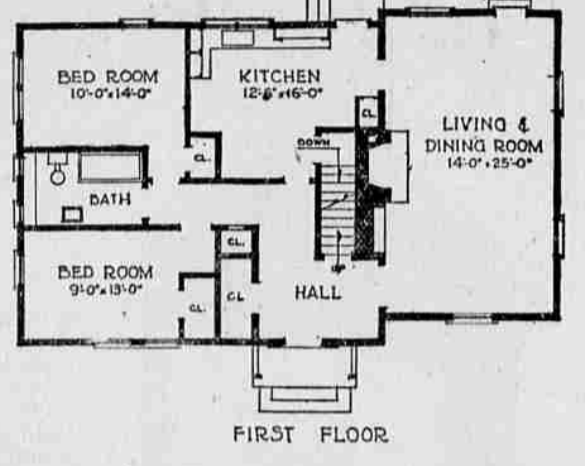


This simple, direct story-and-a-half house is of distinctly Cape Cod origin. It was built in Oregon on a \$500 lot at a cost of \$3,500, from plans supplied by the Universal Plan Service. The owner made a down payment of \$800, and the balance of the cost was financed by a \$3,200 mortgage insured by the Federal Housing Administration.

The difference in window sizes is interesting and gives the impression that the wing has been added at a later date to the main body of the house. The living-room windows are one light of glass longer than the others, with a difference in size between the upper and lower sash, thus bringing the sill closer to the floor with a correspondingly better view of outdoors.

The plan incorporates the dining area in the living room, which conserves space and makes this double-duty room larger than would otherwise be possible.

The arrangement of the hall is good, making it possible to reach all the rooms of the house direct without passing through another room. With the addition of dormers, either in front or rear, the half story above could be utilized for bedrooms.



CAMPUS QUIET ON MILITARY MEASURE

CORVALLIS, Nov. 5.—(AP)—Decline of the anti-compulsory student military training bill caused little stir around the campus of Oregon State college. The vote in Benton county was three to one against the measure and even more one-sided in the city of Corvallis.

The attention the issue had gained nationally is indicated by several requests received here for comments by officials on the issue following the vote. Replies have been that the college interprets the vote as an expression of confidence in the system that has followed with some variations since 1917.

An observation that Oregon voters were still in a "no" voting mood was made by the Daily Barometer, student newspaper which opposed the bill and which favored the compulsory student activity fee bill voted down last January.

SPEED PROSECUTION TOWNSEND AND AIDES

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5.—(AP)—United States District Attorney Leslie C. Garnett said today presentation to the grand jury of contempt citations preferred by the house against Dr. Francis E. Townsend, old age pension leader, and two associates probably would start within ten days.

Garnett said the grand jury would be asked to indict Townsend and John B. Kiefer and Dr. Clinton Winder, also of the Townsend organization, for contempt.

expand a waterfront "sitdown" strike into a general walkout, with charges of violence and intended violence exchanged by a shipowner and the head of a seaman's group.

John M. Franklin, president of the International Mercantile Marine Corp., charged that an "organized group of malcontents" had instituted a "reign of terror."

Joseph Curran, chairman of the seamen's defense committee, retorted that ship owners had hired "mobsters" to break up picket lines. Curran said he would ask for volunteers to picket all docks.

Striking seamen at Boston sought to push their attempts to tie up the port, although their leader, Bennett Murphy, was arrested on a warrant charging drunkenness.

An immediate threat to San Francisco's food supply was removed when striking warehousemen, affiliated with the International Longshoremen's association, agreed to move perishable fruits and vegetables.

But at Fairbanks, Alaska, the chamber of commerce asserted merchants have food enough to last only 30 days.
