

ELECTION PLACES NEXT LEGISLATURE UNDER JOINT RULE

Democrats Will Have Majority in House While Republicans Hold Balance of Power in Upper Branch

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 5.—(AP)—Democrats and Republicans will share

joint control of the Oregon state legislature, it appeared today on the basis of near-complete returns from Tuesday's election.

The Democrats, with 36 seats to 23 Republicans and one independent, will have a majority in the house for the second time in half a century.

Republicans appeared certain of 19 seats in the senate to 11 for the Democrats. In addition to the 14 senate holdovers, of which nine are Republicans and five Democrats, the election, the new set-up will include 10 Republican and 6 Democrat newly-elected.

TUTTLE GRANTED CHANCE TO REPAY CLAIMS IN FRAUD

A six months' suspended sentence, upon condition that he make financial restitution, was granted A. L. Tuttle, former California Oregon Power company employe at Ashland charged with obtaining money under false pretenses, by Circuit Judge H. D. Norton yesterday.

The court was informed that employment in a northwest city and promised to repay creditors. The suspended sentence is also subject to revocation in case of violation.

Tuttle has been held in the county jail for several weeks. Up to the current trouble he bore a good reputation for conduct and industriousness. His wife and two children are in the east. Friends aided in securing employment. His present difficulty was the first with the law.
