#### Steel Industry Ahead.

The American Iron and Steel Institute reported employment in the steel industry in September broke all records for the industry with 524,700 workers on payrolls, compared with 522,400 in August and up 23 per cent from September of 1935.

In Chicago, as the board of Standard Oil Co. of Indiana ordered an extra of \$1, and the regular dividend of 23 cents, a total of some \$18,500,000.

The associated freight movement rose to 79 per cent of the 1929-30 average, a new top since June, 1931.

date for the increased price schedule. Only a stay of execution pending an appeal to the state supreme court apparently could prevent the order from going into effect soon.

Whether an appeal would be made could not be ascertained because John H. Hall, attorney for Sweeney and Kennedy, was out of the city. One source said such a step was not probable.

Under the order previously held up by the temporary injunction, 4 per cent milk would be increased from 11 to 12 cents a quart, 5 per cent milk would be increased from 12 to 14 cents and 6 per cent milk would jump from 13 to 15 cents.

A prolonged hearing on the injunction ended several days ago. Only the Portland area would be affected.
