

GAIN IN BUSINESS BRINGS ADDITIONS TO POSTAL STAFF

Because of increased business and the 40-hour week, Medford postoffice has been authorized to increase its staff by two regular clerks and one regular carrier, effective November 1, it was announced today by Postmaster Frank DeSouza.

The additions give the postoffice the largest staff it has ever had. The increase was authorized by the postoffice department at Washington after an examination of business and facilities had been made here by S. H. Moore, postal inspector, Mr. DeSouza said.

William S. Rose and Prentice Petty have been promoted from substitute clerks to regular clerks and Charles Pettigrew has been advanced from substitute carrier to regular carrier. New schedules following the increase in the staff are now being worked out.

New substitute clerks are Chester Silliman, Boyce Kellogg and Delmar Myers, the authorization from Washington permitting the employment of an extra substitute, Mr. DeSouza announced. Ruppert Maddox is the new substitute carrier. All appointments were made from civil service ratings.

Mr. DeSouza also announced that Kendrick Watson, who was taken from the rolls because of a business slack after years of service as a substitute carrier at the Ashland postoffice, was recently reinstated as a substitute carrier at the Medford postoffice.
