

Oregon State and California Stage Upsets in Coast Gridiron Frays

BEAVERS TRAMPLE ON COUGARS 16-6 IN HECTIC UPSET

Joe Gray Leads Staters To Brilliant Win—Victors Quash Aerial Attacks, Follow Ball.

PULLMAN, Wash., Nov. 7.—(AP)—A band of ball-hawking Beavers from Oregon State dealt Washington State college boys a 16-6 upset today in turning back the favored Cougars, 16 to 6.

The Beavers outclassed the pass-throwing Cougars at their own game and paralyzed the W. S. C. attack with repeated interceptions in critical spots.

Joe (Gray Ghost) Gray, despite an injury that threatened to keep him from the game, led Oregon state to its brilliant upset victory over the team which previously had been unbeaten and had been held to a tie by Southern California.

The Beavers struck suddenly through the air for two touchdowns in the second period. The first came after Gray intercepted one of Ed Goddard's passes on the O. S. C. 30 and ran it back to the 39. With the ball on the 42, Gray tossed a short pass to Bob Mountain, halfback, who dashed 58 yards to score. Swanson missed the try-for-point kick.

Gray led the Beavers to another touchdown after Kolberg intercepted another pass on the O. S. C. 27. The Beavers carried the ball to the Cougars' 34 with a consistent ground and air attack, and scored on Gray's pass to Mountain, who was a stride from the goal.

The Cougar passing attack continued to miss on all cylinders in the third period, and Kolberg's interception on the W. S. C. 30 paved the way for the final three O. S. C. points. The Beavers gained two first downs, the second on the two and a half yard mark. After the Cougars held three times, Hutehings, substitute O. S. C. guard, place-kicked a field goal from the 20-yard mark.

Washington State's only aerial flash came at the opening of the fourth period and carried 75 yards to a touchdown. With Goddard, Dougherty and Littlefield alternating on the throwing end, the Cougars completed seven straight tosses. The final 16-yard pass, Godard to Welchko, was in the end zone for a score. Dougherty's kick for the extra point failed.

Statistics on the game showed a Washington State edge on yardage, but the Beavers struck spectacularly when it counted.

W.S.C. made 14 first downs to Oregon's seven and gained 237 yards to the Beavers' 207. The winner completed five passes in 12 attempts, while Washington State threw 81 and completed 11. Oregon State intercepted seven, several in critical spots. W.S.C. intercepted four.

STANFORD HALTS HUSKY DRIVES TO GAIN 14-14 TIE
STANFORD STADIUM, Stanford University, Calif., Nov. 7.—(UP)—In a football game that offered every trick in the book, Stanford University's Cardinals and the Huskies of the University of Washington fought to a 14-14 tie today in their Pacific coast conference clash before 42,500 spectators here.

Nobody down on that sunbaked greensward gave a thought to defense in the slashing slicing, slambang battle the meeting between these two old rivals of the gridiron produced.

Both teams attacked unceasingly, never letting up in a barrage of passes and furious smashes as the tackles that provided 60 minutes of fire cracker action.

There were long passes and short ones, spectacular shovel passes and darting laterals, and once, when a punt seemed in order, a "suicide" fourth down pass that proved to be the turning point of Washington's last touchdown march.

The battle produced a Washington touchdown early in the second quarter, a Stanford touchdown to tie it a few minutes later, a Stanford score in the third period and then while thousands sat still, a Washington drive of 79 yards that failed on the one-foot mark and finally in the final quarter a Washington 64-yard march for a touchdown and a conversion that tied the game.

Hustling Jimmy Cain, when occasion demands is Washington's fullback or right or left halfback, got both touchdowns for the Huskies from Seattle, and Al Cruser and Elmer Loge kicked the points after Cain's score.

RECOVERED BALL NETS UCLANS 7-0 WIN O'ER OREGON

Gammon's Bobble Paves Way For Score—Webfoot Stage Lone Spurt In Punt Drive.

MULTNOMAH STADIUM, Portland, Ore., Nov. 7.—(AP)—A recovered fumble, a 27-yard unimpaired goal line thrust and the U.C.L.A. Bruins today picked up a 7 to 0 coast conference victory over the University of Oregon Webfoots.

Except for the fire of the first period touchdown, 8900 spectators saw the defensive teams deslacked in a punting duel.

Ten minutes from the kickoff, Dave Gammon, Oregon's sophomore halfback, bobbed on his own 27-yard line. Left end Pike of the Bruins speared the skittering ball to start the southerners on their winning march.

Left halfback Cantor and Fred Funk, battering right half, alternated to smash to the Oregon 18. Fullback Schell skidded off left tackle to the center, Cantor made a yard and then ran into a pile of Webfoot linemen, bounced off and darted across the goal.

Schell booted the extra point from placement.

Late in the third period and early in the fourth the Webfoots, by no means the same team holding Washington 7 to 0 a week ago, made their only threat of the game. Led by Jimmy Nicholson, reserve left halfback, they nudged up to the Bruin 29. Held by a stiffening U.C.L.A. line, the Webfoots were forced to punt.

The ball went out of bounds on the 27, a net gain of two yards.

That brief spurt introduced and also ended Oregon's only drive into Bruin territory.

Fred Funk's long accurate punts set the Webfoots on their own ten late in the final period, after kicking out. Oregon discovered itself pushed back and back with the Uclans pressing into touchdown regions at the close of the game.

With no consistent gains, both elevenes punted frequently on their own. The booting of Funk and Gammon kept play in midfield the major part of the contest.

TROJANS BEATEN 13 TO 7 BY BEARS IN GRID CLASSIC

MEMORIAL STADIUM, LOS ANGELES, Nov. 7.—(UP)—The University of California, pushed all around all season, staged a sensational gridiron comeback here today to defeat the hitherto unbeaten University of Southern California team, 13 to 7.

California scored in the first and third periods on two sensational drives. Southern California put over a touchdown as the third quarter started.

A crowd of 85,000 watched the bitter struggle between two fighting elevenes. The game was bitterly disappointing to U. S. C., as it may run Trojan chances for the Rose Bowl, following the Trojan record was marked only by a scoreless tie with Washington State college.

The first Bear touchdown was a personal triumph for Herwig, California's 210-pound candidate for all-America center. Climaxing a California march, Herwig took a lateral pass from End William Dolman on the Trojan 29-yard line and ploughed his way across for the score.

Southern California went to the front shortly after the third quarter opened. Schwartz, right end for California, took the Trojan kickoff and fumbled on his own 34-yard line where Henderson, U. S. C. right end recovered. Southern California sent Davis Davis, their star quarterback, over for a touchdown in seven smashing plays.

Henderson converted a place kick to give Troy the lead.

California's recovery from the temporary setback was a brilliant chapter in the battle of thrills. Receiving the kickoff again, the Golden Bears scored in two plays. Chapman brought Bear fans to their feet with a 43-yard return of the kickoff.

On the next play Bottari, fullback, faked back and shot a long pass at Fred, quarterback. The ball was partially deflected by Capt. Gil Kuhn, U. S. C. center, but Meek grabbed it to complete a pass on the Trojan 30-yard mark.

Bottari followed this aerial effort with a pass to Chapman, who caught the ball on the Trojan 10-yard line. Studied several tacklers and cut back across the field to plunge over the goal. Sparks, left end, converted from placement.

The Wolves were held on the defensive for a greater part of the battle with the lone score coming in the closing minutes when Borden crossed after a steady advance from midfield and then kicked the goal.

The Bears marched inside the 10-yard line three times, and tried three unsuccessful field goals. A hidden play produced a thrill in the second quarter when Van Diver, quarterback, took a pass from Agee and ran to Oregon Normal's 10.

The game was an exciting one, despite a cold wind that played havoc with the kicking of both teams. One SONS play, instead of showing the ball back to the deep fullback for a pass as had been done previously, the quarterback tucked it behind his back and romped to the SONS 10-yard line, from where bucks carried it over for the score with only a minute left in the game. After the Monmouth score and conversation, the SONS passed desperately, the dying gun finding them passing futilely in midfield.

Fenburg was outstanding at tackle for the SONS.

The defeat was the first for Ashland in a homecoming struggle.

IRISH BEATEN BY NAVY FIELD GOAL OFF INGRAM'S TOE

BALTIMORE, Nov. 7.—(AP)—Bill Ingram, last to carry on his family's brilliant gridiron tradition at the naval academy, booted a 25-yard dropkick in the third period today to give the sailors a 9 to 0 victory over Notre Dame and extinguish a losing streak that had sent the Midshipmen reeling before three major foes this season.

As 57,500 looked on in Municipal stadium, the Tars cashed in on their one chief scoring opportunity, then fought fiercely to protect their slender lead with a defense that time after time broke up Irish air raids.

The Midshipmen—out-lucked by Yale, out-manuevered by Princeton and outplayed by Pennsylvania—had the big crowd cheering wildly as they battled courageously against a heavier, favored Notre Dame team, halting four touchdown bids.

Sneed Schmidt set the scene for the Navy's scoring by a "coffin corner" punt in the third quarter that rolled out on Notre Dame's one-yard line. Ingram, the 170-pound son of Jonas Ingram, old Navy fullback, returned O'Neill's kick 30 yards to Notre Dame's 21 and then slipped through the line to the ten.

After two line thrusts failed and Ingram's pass over the goal barely eluded Bob Antrim's fingers, Bill stepped back to the 15 and smacked a dropkick through the center of the posts.

YANKEE STADIUM, NEW YORK, Nov. 7.—(UP)—Carnegie Tech defeated New York University 14-6 today in a football game played under a drizzle and with only 9,000 fans in the vast stadium. New York University scored in the last ten seconds.

EX-TIGER STARS AID FROSH WIN

SEATTLE, Nov. 7.—(AP)—University of Oregon's brawny freshman football team, after a 49-yard march to midfield, took to the air today in the last quarter of the game with the University of Washington yearlings, broke a 7-7 tie and won 13 to 7.

By the victory, the Oregon ducklings gained the northern division Pacific coast conference freshman championship.

Washington's Husky pups fell behind in the second period when Bob Smith, Oregon right half, passed left-handed from the Husky 14-yard stripe to Kuzman, left end, for a touchdown. Smith tossed to Graybeal for the extra point.

The Oregon team's third quarter score came when Dick Weisberger, Willamette's husky fullback, interlarded to Newhouse, who galloped 10 yards to a touchdown after the ball was brought into scoring position with a 35-yard drive.

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WILLAMETTE TIES IN FRESNO FRAY

FRESNO, Calif., Nov. 7.—(UP)—The Fresno State college and Willamette university of Salem, Ore., battled to a 14-14 tie in Ratcliffe stadium here today before 6,000 fans.

The Oregon Bearcats, evidently affected by the warm sun that poured on the field, were pushed around by the Fresno team during the first half.

As the sun descended and the air became cool, the Oregon team started the second half with renewed life and scored a touchdown in the third and fourth periods.

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FORDHAM VICTOR OVER PURDUE 15-0

NEW YORK, Nov. 7.—(UP)—The Fordham Rams, and they are "battering rams," played Purdue today and at the end of the first half, with the score 9 to 0 in their favor, they bought their tickets to California and the Rose Bowl.

At the end of the game, when an 80-yard touchdown run by Al Gurske had raised the score to 15 to 0, the Rams made their Pullman reservation.

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IOWA CONQUERED BY GOPHERS, 52-0
