(Continued from Page One) solution. We must mind something new and I believe that is what we are seeking," Dubach stated.

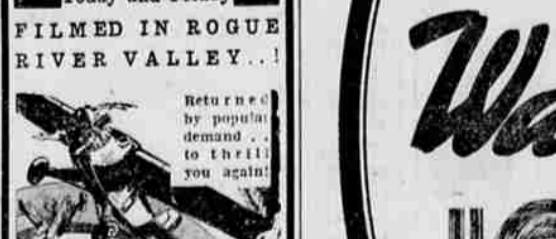
