

BOY SCOUT RALLY PROGRAM LISTED FOR THIS EVENING

Points to Be Awarded Troops of District On Many Activities — Public Invited to Enjoy Events

Boy Scouts of the entire Medford district will gather tonight at the Medford high school gymnasium for their big demonstration of scouting activities. It will be their first district rally of this kind and everything is in order for the prompt opening at 7:30 p. m.

The public is invited to attend and to vote for their neighborhood troop. The rally program and entertainment will be free and a good time is assured all who attend.

In addition to the eight troops listed in last evening's edition of the Medford Mail Tribune, there will also be troop 35 of Jacksonville and troop 40 of Central Point. These two troops "will be present with bells on," according to both Erle White and J. E. Vincent, scoutmasters, today.

The program for the rally tonight is as follows:

1. Punctuality—100 percent of the troop's membership of scouts and scouters present for the roll-call at 7:25 p. m. will give the troop 100 points toward the rally trophy.

2. Attendance—100 percent of the membership present or legitimate written excuses will entitle the troop to 100 points.

3. Attendance of Visitors—Based on the number of visitors' cards turned in at the door per registered membership of the troop and the troop with the best percentage will receive 100 points.

4. Opening Presentation of Colors Ceremony—One scout and the American flag of each troop.

5. Flag Display—100 points to each troop with all of its patrol flags, its troop flag and the American flag, properly displayed, etc.

6. Knot-Tying—Team of six scouts from each troop, prepared to tie the following knots: Figure-of-eight, square, sheet bend, fisherman's, slip and bowline. This will be run in relay form and 100 points to the troop finished first, with five points off for each knot incorrectly tied.

7. Signaling—Team of four scouts per troop. A sealed message will be opened by each team and signalled with flags to the opposite end of the floor; 100 points to the team finished first, with five points off for each word left out or misspelled.

8. Song Contest—Two songs will be sung by each troop—"Hilting to Victory" and an original troop song. 100 points will be given if both songs are rendered.

9. Fire-by-Friction—One scout from each troop will attempt to make fire without the use of matches and by rubbing sticks together; 100 points to the first troop to get a flame. There will be a time limit on events 9 and 10.

10. Fire by Flint and Steel—One scout from each troop using flint and steel will attempt to make fire and to the first troop to obtain a flame will be given 100 points.

11. Undressing Race—One scout from each troop, fully uniformed, will enter this race and the first scout to finish and to be completely redressed will receive 100 points. Five points will be taken off for each mistake made or button not fastened, etc.

12. Skin the Snake—A team of ten scouts from each troop, and to the first team finished without a break 100 points will be given. Teams which break will be disqualified.

13. Yell Contest—Two yells from each troop—one for the troop using the troop's number and one for the district using the name "Medford District" 100 points to the troop yelling both yells.

14. Participation—1000 points will be given to each troop which enters all the events of the program. Troops must furnish the correct number of scouts and the necessary equipment in order to be counted as entering all events.

15. Closing—Colors will be presented, the salute and the scout oath. "All in all there is a possible total of 3100 points. The rally trophy will be presented to the troop with the highest number of points by the council president, Larry J. Schade," according to Frank Hull, Medford district commissioner in charge of the rally.

CHESTER F. LEWIS RITES TO BE HELD HERE ON SUNDAY

Funeral services for Chester F. Lewis, Prospect resident who died Monday morning in Green Bay, Wis., will be held in the Perle chapel here at 2 o'clock Sunday afternoon. Interment will be in the Medford memorial mausoleum.

Services at the chapel and the mausoleum will be conducted by Medford lodge 103, A. F. and A. M. Honorary pallbearers will be Al Littrell, George T. Frey, Chester Hubbard, Jimmy Valentine, John Holmes and William F. Isaac. Active pallbearers will be members of Hillah temple patrol, of which Mr. Lewis was a member.

Mr. Lewis died of pulmonary embolism while he was visiting relatives in Green Bay, preparatory to returning to his home in Prospect. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Austin D. Lewis of Prospect, were with him. He had gone east with his parents to take delivery of a new automobile in South Bend, Ind.

Chester Frank Lewis was born in Everett, Wash., on June 16, 1905. He received his education in Everett.

The family came to Medford in 1921 and later moved to San Jose, Cal. In 1929 the family returned to Oregon, taking up residence in Prospect where they established a lumber business under the name of Lewis Brothers.

Chester Lewis was well known and held in high esteem in southern Oregon. He was a member of Golden Rule lodge 479, A. and A. M., Blue Hill Masons and Hillah temple of Ashland, having been active in all Masonic circles.

He is survived by his parents and a brother, Austin D. Lewis, Jr., also of Prospect.
