

PURUCKER ACTION AGAINST JOB LAW NEARS DISMISSAL

A motion for the dismissal of suit, and application for a temporary injunction, of Herman O. Purucker and 17 other Medford business firms, and 19 other Medford firms, on interpleader, against the Oregon State Unemployment Insurance Commission, will be sought by Attorney O. H. Bengtson, counsel for plaintiffs. The suit attacked the constitutionality of the state jobless insurance law, and the injunction sought to restrain its enforcement.

The unemployment commission, according to Attorney Bengtson, has modified the original interpretation of the law, which provided that employers of less than four employees did not come under the provisions of the unemployment insurance law. Under this interpretation, large employers were held liable for penalties and payments, when employers of less than four employees were engaged, under the unemployment law.

Purucker and other plaintiffs held in the suit that this ruling was discriminatory and resulted in the California Oregon Power Co. of this city denying them jobs and work, because they were not within the unemployment law. The plaintiffs were engaged in businesses that brought frequent orders from the power company.

According to Attorney Bengtson, the unemployment commission has sent letters to the plaintiffs, advising them that the power company will not be liable for contributions or penalties under the law. The power company has also notified the plaintiffs to the same effect.

Attorney Bengtson said he would take final legal steps next week for the dismissal of the action. Purucker, an electrical contractor, and co-plaintiffs alleged that the law deprived them of business.

SEN. McNARY AIDS PLANS TO ENLARGE FEDERAL OFFICES

Senator Charles L. McNary plans to give his personal attention to Medford's efforts in acquiring additional federal building space as soon as he returns to Washington, D. C., in about a month. It was stated by Col. E. E. Kelly, yesterday upon his return from Salem, where he conferred with the senator.

Senator McNary's Washington office is looking after the matter now and Colonel Kelly was of the opinion that the senator himself would expediate consideration of Medford's plea for a new or larger federal building upon his return to the capital.

"He will do everything he can for us; that goes without saying," Colonel Kelly commented.

MORRIS NAMED AS ESPEE AIDE HERE

F. G. Morris, formerly of Eugene, has replaced F. W. Satchwell as local agent for the Southern Pacific railroad, officials have announced. Satchwell, who was sent to the Medford post on the promotion of John Carle, was unable to remain because of ill health and has returned to his home at Silverton.

Morris was an operator in the local station 19 years ago and has a number of friends here. He has been with the company as agent in a number of towns on the coast.

INQUEST FINDING PUTS BLAME FOR CRASH ON MATRON

A coroner's jury, in findings returned late Friday, hold Mrs. Lovick Waymack, county jail matron, responsible for the auto-motorcycle accident last Sunday afternoon on the Clingdale hill section of the Crater Lake highway, resulting in the death later of Walter E. Van Rheen, 23, of Eagle Point.

Four of the six members of the coroner's jury, signed the findings. They were: Thomas J. Puseo, H. F. Platt, T. M. Kurts, and T. A. Waterman. The two not signing were H. N. Butler and L. G. Morthland.

Deputy District Attorney George W. Nelson said the findings would be presented to the grand jury scheduled to resume sessions tomorrow.

Mrs. Waymack did not testify at the inquest, owing to injuries received in the crash.

Van Rheen was a passenger aboard a motorcycle driven by Glenn Brown. Just beyond the brow of Clingdale hill the motorcycle struck the rear fender of Mrs. Waymack's auto, and were hurled off the road. Mrs. Waymack sustained chest injuries when her auto left the road, and rammed an embankment.

Van Rheen and Brown underwent amputations of their right legs Monday, in an effort to save their lives. Van Rheen failed to rally. Brown's condition was reported as "hopeful."
