ENGINEER STUDIES FLOOD TOLL HERE

Preliminary survey of direct damage done by flood waters of Rogue river and Bear creek was made today by Lieut. B. A. Eddy, army engineer from Portland.

Before recording statistics Lieut. Eddy conferred with Olen Arnspicer, manager of the Medford and Talent irrigation districts. He made no comment on his survey and left later in the day for coastal points.

Lieut. Eddy is making a preliminary study of flood damage done in the entire Rogue river watershed as a follow-up of the public hearing conducted here some time ago by Col. Milo P. Fox, district army engineer in Portland. The study was authorized by act of congress.
