ORCHARD PROBLEM SOLVED BY RAINS

HOOD RIVER, Nov. 17. - (AP) - Welcome rains of last night and today in the mid-Columbia area solved a perplexing problem for orchardists - to irrigate or not to irrigate. Such action apparently will not be necessary. Gordon C. Brown, horticulturist at the Hood River experiment station, previously said the soil was so deficient in moisture that damage might result if below-zero temperatures arrived. It was pointed out that sufficient irrigation water is available but that it would be just as disastrous to over-wet the soil as to have it too dry.

ENTOMBED MINERS ARE FOUND DEAD

SUPERIOR, Mont., Nov. 17. - (AP) - The bodies of Antoine Gustafson, 40, and Oscar Gerwar, 45, gold miners buried in a slide at the Windfall placer mine near here Saturday night, were brought from their mountain tomb today.

Trapped in the narrow tunnel under the bed of Dry creek, the men were found on top of the sliding slide near the end of the 100-foot bore. "They might have been alive even last night when we thought we were about to reach them," said Fred Mas and Bud La Combe, partners of Gustafson and Gerwar.

The bodies were not crushed, but their hands were torn and bruised, and La Combe and Mas said this indicated they had dug barehanded to clamber on top of the watery earth and rock.

COURT SUSPENDS PORTLAND LAWYER

SALEM, Nov. 17. - (AP) - Oregon supreme court suspended Elbert Eastman, Portland attorney, from practicing law in Oregon for one year, on charges of "serious misconduct," in a written opinion by Justice George Rossman, handed down today. The complaint against Eastman was filed by the grievance committee of the Oregon State Bar on six findings against him. In the only other opinion handed down today the court affirmed the \$2,500 personal injury judgment in favor of Mrs. F. W. Saunders of The Dalles against the A. M. Williams and Carr company.

AWAIT DECISION ON STORK DERBY

TORONTO, Nov. 17. - (AP) - The hopes of Toronto's "stork derby" mothers of collecting \$500,000 from the estate of bachelor Charles Vance Miller were in the hands of Justice W. E. Middleton today. After a hearing yesterday in which relatives of Miller sought to break the will on grounds it encouraged the birth of illegitimate children, Justice Middleton said he would decide within a week "if at all possible."

Counsel both for the Miller relatives and the prize claimants indicated they would appeal if the decision went against their clients.

The onions will be held for midwest and eastern markets after Christmas.

FARMER DROWNS SELF IN STOCK WATER HOLE ALBANY, Nov. 17. - (AP) - With a weight around his neck Thomas Sylvester, 40-year-old Pleasant valley farmer, leaped to his death in a stock-watering hole on his place yesterday. CANADA EXTENDS TRADE AIRLINES; TAPS NEW AREAS

OTTAWA, Ont., (UP) - The Canadian government is intensifying development of commercial aviation in Canada and the far north. It is spending \$1,000,000 in completing the great trans-Canada air-mail route, and \$700,000 improving commercial aircraft services in the mining and hunting regions of the north.

Stretching from Halifax, N.S., and running via Montreal, Ottawa and Winnipeg across to Vancouver, the trans-Canadian air-mail is destined to provide a vital link with the Atlantic and Pacific services. Ultimately it will become an important link of an air-mail service stretching round the globe.

The trans-Canada service, it is expected, will be in operation early next spring. Most of the intermediate landing-grounds have been completed. Many of them are to be provided with wireless. They will also have night-flying equipment. The main airframes will have meteorological and wireless direction-finding stations, and also the latest type of approach beacons.

The trans-Canada service will be linked to the Imperial Airways trans-Atlantic mail service which will be financed jointly by British, United States, Irish Free State, Newfoundland and Canadian aviation interests. Canada's share in the financing will be a subsidy of \$375,000 annually.

The government is making vast and hitherto untapped areas in the far north accessible to prospectors and surveyors by improving aviation facilities. A system of regular air transport is being maintained between rail-heads and mines lying far from any convenient center of supply. In the fur trade, also, the plane is playing an increasingly important part, an immense amount of time being saved by the transport of loads by air.

ROOSEVELT SPENT \$670 IN CAMPAIGN

WASHINGTON, Nov. 17. - (AP) - President Roosevelt reported today his re-election cost him exactly \$670. His personal campaign expenditures statement, written in his own hand, listed one contribution of \$150 to the town committee of Hyde Park, N. Y., during the last month of the campaign. The only other expenditure noted in his post-election report was \$10 for "additional postage."

An earlier report had recorded another \$10 for postage and a \$500 donation to the Duchesne county, New York, Democratic committee. He reported he had received no contributions.

SUSPENSION OF LEWIS CENTER OF HOT FIGHT IN LABOR CONVENTION

TAMPA, Fla., Nov. 17. - (AP) - Praising a heated fight on the floor, eight resolutions condemning suspension of John L. Lewis' 10 rebel unions were introduced today at the American Federation of Labor convention. They conflicted with one resolution, introduced by John P. Frey, president of the metal trades department, calling for expulsion of the rebels.

Meanwhile the federation's high command had all but finally decided to propose convention approval of the suspensions and to continue efforts to bring Lewis and his industrial unions allies back into the federation. Frey not only proposed expulsion for "insurrection," but introduced a second resolution calling for an A. F. of L. boycott on all goods produced by the rebels. His resolution included in the rebel group the Typographical union and the United Hatters, Cap and Millinery workers.

The unions were not suspended, but an officer of each belongs to Lewis' committee for industrial organization.
