Hazards Continue—With forest fire hazards continuing high, lookouts are still being kept on the job, this being the latest they have been employed for years. The falling of dry leaves and needles in recent weeks has made hazards as great as they have been at any other time this year, it was said by Karl L. Janouch, supervisor of the Rogue river national forest. He asked that every possible precaution be taken by hunters and others who enter the forests.

To Landscape—General landscaping of Lithia park in Ashland is to be undertaken soon with labor furnished by the national youth administration. The project will employ seven eligible youths who will work 50 hours a month at a wage of about \$17.

The truck must have a capacity of 120 cubic feet and be capable of being closed and locked. The present truck contract, held by J. J. Osenbrugg, expires December 31.

Medford Aerie Wins—The wager as to which aerie would have the greater number of members present at last night's Eagles' meeting in Ashland was won by the Medford lodge. The local aerie had a large delegation present, including the chapter and auxiliary drill teams which paraded through Ashland streets prior to the meeting. Medford aerie and auxiliary will hold their regular weekly meetings in the West Main street lodge hall at 8 o'clock tonight. An initiation ceremony is to be held and Ashland aerie members have been invited.

Range Conference—An all-day conference on range improvement under the soil conservation and domestic allotment act was held yesterday at the Rogue river national forest service headquarters in federal building here. The meeting was conducted by Carl Ewing, supervisor of the Malheur national forest, now serving as acting director of range examinations under the AAA, and Melvin H. Burke, Fremont national forest ranger now serving as field inspector for range examinations in the southern Oregon district. Attending the conference were Karl L. Janouch, supervisor of the Rogue river national forest; H. C. Obye, assistant supervisor, and Lee Port, Simeril Jarvi, Hugh Ritter and Jesse DeWitt, district rangers. Eighteen applications for range improvement benefits have now been received by Mr. Janouch's office from Jackson county ranchers. Under the act, benefits are allowed for such improvements as wells, dams to halt erosion, fire breaks and contours to spread water flow and avert the cutting of gullies. The cash benefits to be paid will not fully compensate for the cost of the improvements and are intended only as an aid in such work. Mr. Janouch said.

NEED OF DEFENSE BY AIR ON COAST SHOWN BY STAUB

(Continued from Page One) America's best informed men in aeronautical affairs, talked of the growing tension in Europe and Asia, already manifested in the Manchukuo and Ethiopian affairs, and the present Spanish revolution, which he called a potential start of another world war. The activities of Japan in fortifying and equipping with airports the Japanese mandated islands in the Pacific were outlined by Dr. Staub, in pointing out the necessity of this country to awake to the need for suitable, impregnable defense with a strong air force in the first line. Few men who are elected to congress have knowledge of defense problems or the understanding of aviation problems, Dr. Staub said. Lack of government support to this fast-growing industry and branch of defense was indicated by statistics outlined by the speaker. Harbors, rivers and water transportation have been subsidized by the federal government to the amount of \$1,750,000,000, while railroads and bus transportation has received government aid approximating \$1,500,000,000, he stressed. Aviation subsidies have amounted to only \$9,000,000, of which two-thirds has been returned in stamp revenues, he declared. In an interview with the Mail Tribune, Dr. Staub amplified his remarks in citing government aid given aviation in foreign countries. One German plant, operating under a subsidy, employs 2,000 persons regularly with an output of 1,000 planes monthly, he said. One Russian plant has a capacity of 2,000 army planes monthly and the Russian air force has facilities for landing 3,000 machine gunners in one assault, he added. The 1935 airplane production in this county was only 475 units, he recalled, and said the load for aviation development in this country must, by necessity, be carried by private airlines and manufacturers because of the lack of federal financial aid. In concluding his address, Dr. Staub pointed out that the shortest air route from Tokohama to this country was not by way of the islands employed by the Clipper ships, but instead to the northwest area when planes have been perfected for safe flying over longer distances. "Medford needs no concessions," was the vital message of Col. Popp. "We fully realize the need for an air development program in southern Oregon; it has been decided upon and

is going forward" Col. Popp paid a tribute to the sympathetic interest of Dr. Staub in Medford's aviation problems. Dr. Staub has long been considered by citizens here familiar with aviation affairs as a genuine friend and supporter of this community.

Lieutenant H. A. Stanley acted as chairman for today's meeting and music was furnished by Schmor's orchestra. Mayor George W. Porter will accompany Dr. Staub and Col. Popp on their flight back to Portland today.

OAKLAND, BERKELEY QUIT MILK BUSINESS Oakland and Berkeley city governments last night went out of the milk business as suddenly as they went in when dairy operators made peace with union operators and it was announced normal distribution of milk would be resumed immediately.
