

**BIG INVESTMENTS
IN LOCAL MINING
TOLD PLAN BOARD**

**D. H. Ferry Says \$1,400,000
Spent in Dredge Opera-
tion During Past Eight
Years—Back Martin Aims**

GRANTS PASS, Nov. 20.—(AP)—Josephine county major gold producers, who for years have been reticent on issuing cost and production figures because they believed they might be misused, today threw their weight behind Governor Martin's program for mining revival and creation of a state bureau.

Reporting to the county plan board last night, they announced formation of an association to issue accredited figures through the board's mineral advisory committee, headed by Wm. F. Hayden, to show the importance mining has already achieved.

Ferry Cites Figures
With only a portion of the producers reporting, they showed that over \$1,000,000 is invested in equipment.

D. H. Ferry, who operates a large dredge at Grave creek, reported his company had spent \$1,400,000 in the last eight years, in its new location and its previous one on Poota creek in western Jackson county, and had a payroll of 64 men. He said the physical plant now represents investment of \$400,000. He cited other large dredges being installed.

Others reporting included Earl Nixon, who said \$75,000 had been invested in the Esterly mine at Waido in the last 18 months, with a payroll of 30 to 40 men, and A. R. McGuire, operating the old Channel mine, who said \$65,000 had been invested there in a similar period with approximately half of the property developed.

**M'CARL SAYS BUDGET
CAN BE BALANCED BY
STOPPAGE OF WASTE**

BOSTON, Mass., Nov. 20.—(AP)—John R. McCarl, former comptroller general of the United States, declared today the national budget "can be and must be balanced by reducing costs of government" an "stopping waste."

In a prepared speech before the governors' session of the New England conference, he asserted "we must cut costs everywhere—and there are as many points for immediate attack as there are government activities."

"We should put on the brakes—not so sharply as to induce a crash," he said, "but in such a manner as to give immediate assurance that another crash can be avoided, and with such continuing pressure as actually to avoid another crash. Stop needless spending. Husband our resources. Make every dollar count. Quit experimenting with our prob-

lems—get down to business. We must stop borrowing—stop increasing our debt and interest load."
He declared the re-election of President Roosevelt by his large majority was in no sense an approval by the American people of the mistakes of his first administration.

OAKLAND, Calif., Nov. 20.—(AP)—The sister cities of Oakland and Berkeley went into the milk business today.

City governments of both communities had threatened to take over processing and distribution of milk unless labor troubles in Alameda

county, which have tied up distribution, were settled speedily.

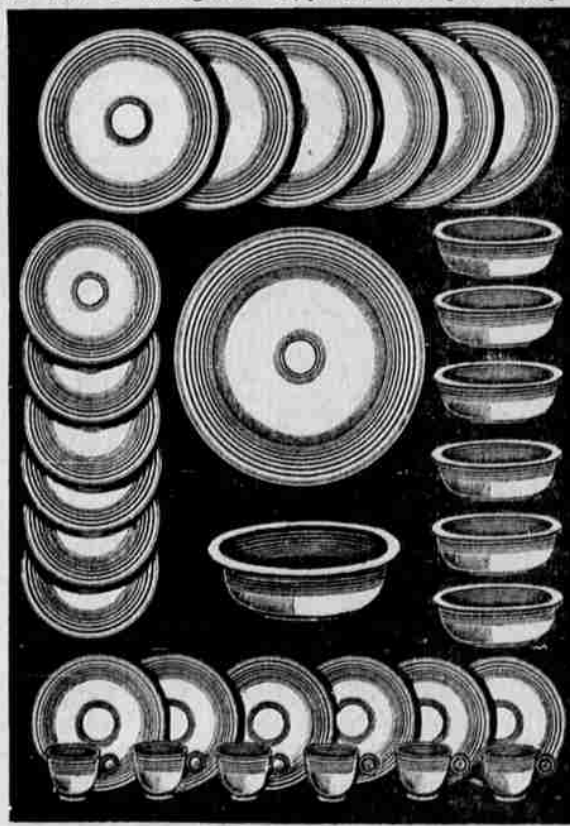
