ACID IS UTILIZED TO PROLONG LIFE OF CUT FLOWERS

PILOT ROUNDS UP WILD HORSE HERD; PLAN IS SUCCESS

HONOLULU (UP)—The century-old problem of how to make cut flowers last the longest possible time is being solved in the research laboratories of the Hawaiian Sugar Planters' association here.

MARYSVILLE, Cal. (UP)—The first experiments in using planes instead of cowboys in rounding up wild horses have been made in Nevada.

The new method just developed consists of adding a few drops of sulphurous acid to the water in which the flowers are kept. It will prolong the freshness of some large stemmed varieties up to four and five days, tests disclosed.

The success would indicate that the cowboy, at least for this phase of "Wild West" work, soon may become a thing of the past unless he learns to pilot a plane as skillfully as he does his horse. The first experiment at rounding up wild horses by plane was made with Louie Vremaak of the local aviation service at the controls.

Results are declared to exceed greatly those obtained by the use of warm water and aspirin.

By swooping down low over bunches of horses grazing on ranges so extensive that ordinarily a score of cowboys would have been necessary to round them up, Vremaak was able gradually to stampede them.

The formula as concocted by the research laboratory provides for two ordinary sized eye-droppers full of the acid to each pint of water for large flowers like hydrangeas, chrysanthemums, lilies and gladiolas, or one eye dropper full to the pint for small blooms having tender, delicate stems. The cost is about one-half a cent to a pint of water.

Once the entire mass was moving it was then easy to run them into a natural corral in a Nevada canyon, where cowboys afoot were waiting to brush them behind gates and close them in corrals.

Flower lovers, however, are urged to be careful to get sulphurous acid and not sulphuric acid, as the latter is deadly to plants.

The superiority of aviation for this purpose over the old-time roundup by cowboys is declared to lie in several facts. In the first place, only a single flier is necessary to handle a job that would require a dozen or more cowboys.

The laboratory experiments have demonstrated that the more marked effects are obtained with large stemmed plants, presumably because they have a larger amount of natural reserve vitality on which the formula can react than in the case of smaller flowers.

In the second place, the airplane has a stamina which is not possessed by the pony of the plains, which in turn is not sufficient to meet the stamina of wild horses. The latter often break into terrific stampedes that carry a herd for 20 miles. The cowboy's horse is unable to match this endurance.

Hydrangeas were kept four to five days longer with the solution than with ordinary water. Flowers blooming for only one day in the garden were not benefited by the solution, but blooms which stay on growing plants a longer time, usually fading quickly when cut, were prolonged successfully.

The plane, on the other hand, is able to outspeed the swiftest wild horses and guide a stampede into the desired direction.

Chief credit for the discovery goes to Dr. U. K. Dae of Hawaiian Sugar Planters' association chemist. He found that a six percent solution of sulphurous acid proved the ideal mixture to keep down bacterial action which usually causes flowers to die. Only glass or porcelain vases can be used as the solution harms silver or other metals.

While aviation is used for dusting crops and for sowing seeds over vast expanses of land, still one more use is to be made of it, and for which planes of the necessary size are being constructed in southern California. This is for fertilization purposes. A plane is being built with a capacity for carrying 3,000 tons of fertilizer. It will be able to do in an hour or two the work of fertilizing lands which would require days by the use of horses and wagons or even tractors.

The acid gives the flowers a great thurst, causing them to consume five times more water.

TO ERECT SHAFT FOR STRADIVARI AT BIRTH PLACE

CREMONA, Italy.—(UP)—The second centenary of the death of An-

tonio Stradivari, falling due in 1937, will be commemorated here with the erection of a monument in honor of the immortal maker of string instruments, particularly violins, which bear his name and are now worth fabulous sums.

The commemoration will be accompanied by other kindred manifestations.

The monument will rise by initiative of the citizens of Cremona, Stradivari's birthplace. The original plan, dating back as far as 1914 and then abandoned because of viciss-

itudes, was to erect the memorial in occasion of the second centenary of Stradivari's birthday if latter's date had been established with exactness within a reasonable time. But since biographers' researches in the city's archives and records to this effect had proved fruitless, it was decided to honor him in connection with the centenary of his death.

Another manifestation which will take place with the major one, will consist of an exhibition of string instruments of the 18th and 17th centuries, manufactured, besides Stradi-

vari, by none less famous makers like Amati and Guarneri, the former Stradivari's master.

Museums, private collectors, violin players in possession of Stradivari all over the world, and the city of Cremona, will contribute exhibits for this show.

A fair of modern stringed instruments by Italian manufacturers will be held simultaneously with the exhibition. It is planned to make the fair annual thereafter, so that Cremona again will become the empo-

rium of this production as it was in the past.

A third manifestation will consist of a series of open air concerts, in which compositions of the 17th century will be played. Violins, violas, cellos and contrabasses by old masters, which will form the exhibits of the exposition, will be played by celebrated artists. A number of these, both from Europe and the United States, have already announced their intention of playing in these concerts, offering their fees to the fund for the erection of a monument to

Claudio Monteverdi, another Cremonese. This monument will honor the creator of the modern melodrama, and consequently of the early orchestra, in which string instruments had a leading part.
