FRANCISCOVICH TO BE SENATE BOSS SALEM, Ore., Nov. 21.—(AP)—Frank Franciscovich, who may receive the unanimous support of the Oregon senate for presidents of that body since other candidates have announced withdrawal, will not commit himself as to how many votes he will get but said: "I am well satisfied with my campaign for president."

Franciscovich spent some time with Governor Martin here and conferred with the secretary of state to suggest several changes in senate quarters during the coming session.

The senate chamber will be in the Martin hotel dining room which will be connected by tramway with the house chambers in the armory building adjoining.

633 NABBED FOR TRAFFIC ERRORS SALEM, Ore., Nov. 21.—(AP)—Oregon courts convicted 633 automobile drivers the past month for violations of traffic laws, resulting in the revocation of 76 drivers' licenses and the suspension of 19 others, the secretary of state reported today.

Driving while intoxicated accounted for the heaviest toll, due of the revocations being ordered for that cause. One revocation resulted from conviction of involuntary manslaughter, while two were for arrested hit-and-run drivers.

Reckless driving accounted for 16 of the suspensions.

GOVERNMENT MAY CHARTER VESSELS TO HELP ALASKA

(Continued from Page One) the seven maritime unions answered the question.

"We don't like this any more than the ship owners or the public," members said, "but we are not going to give in."

"We can hold out until April, if this thing lasts that long, and we have resources to carry us through until then. We may starve after then but we are not going to give in even if we do."

The committee has evidence to back up its word. It is reported unofficially that they have a "strike treasury" of more than \$200,000 to be used to feed and shelter strikers.

The strikers are encouraged additionally, too, in the belief that the federal government will not permit the families of the maritime workers to suffer.

"Labor put this administration in power and returned it to power," Harry Bridges, president of the International Longshoremen's association of the Pacific, said, "and the administration will support us."

Fear Public Wrath The unions are confident that they have the power to enforce their demands and admit only one fear. They are afraid that the public will suffer from the stagnation of commerce and will turn against the strikers.

The strategy committee, it was revealed, long before the strike was called, decided that if there was a strike, the "pressure" would be "put on gradually."

The unions are confident, too, that they can "put on the pressure." By this means they mean to tie up raw materials and refuse to handle finished products and force idleness upon the Pacific coast and the nation.

The strike already has cost the Pacific coast an estimated \$175,000,000. Labor and industry say the toll is \$7,000,000 a day and, as factory after factory closes its new material, the daily cost is mounting at a rapidly accelerating pace.

Two hundred and sixteen vessels are tied in Pacific coast ports. Unions threatened today to "clamp the lid tighter" on the ports by tying up foreign vessels as well as those flying the American flag.

These archeological finds, which date back to the iron and bronze ages were discovered in a hitherto unknown mound which a forest ranger stumbled upon in the Anzeling forest, near Bouzouville.

After two days of excavation, Delors reached a wide cinder bed and under this found the first tomb. Inside he found two black vases, one fitted into the other, a sword attached to two copper rings, which were formerly slipped on the belt of the warrior, and one long spear.

Further excavations in the forest of Charleville-sous-Bois revealed a more ancient tomb, which Delors claims goes back farther to the bronze age. This tomb contained beautifully engraved pins, almost 15 inches in length, bracelets, collars, curving vases of different sizes, a bronze knife and various large pieces of quartz.

Delors is studying these archeological finds, and when he has completed his report on their historical background, will place them in the Metz museum.

THOMSON, SHUTE IN PRO GOLF FINALS

PINEHURST, N. C., Nov. 21.—(UP)—Jimmy Thomson and Denny Shute, a couple of fellows whose personalities are as different as their golfing styles, today qualified to meet in the final round, pay-off match of the 19th annual P. O. A. tournament.

They will duel tomorrow for the thousand dollar prize that goes to the winner of the toughest golf competition in the world over the long, hard route of 36 holes, and over the long, hard No. 2 Pinehurst course.

Both made the final round the hard way. That is, they came from behind and, with a whooping gallery of hundreds tagging their heels, turned on the heat in the home stretch to win the right to shoot for all the marbles.
