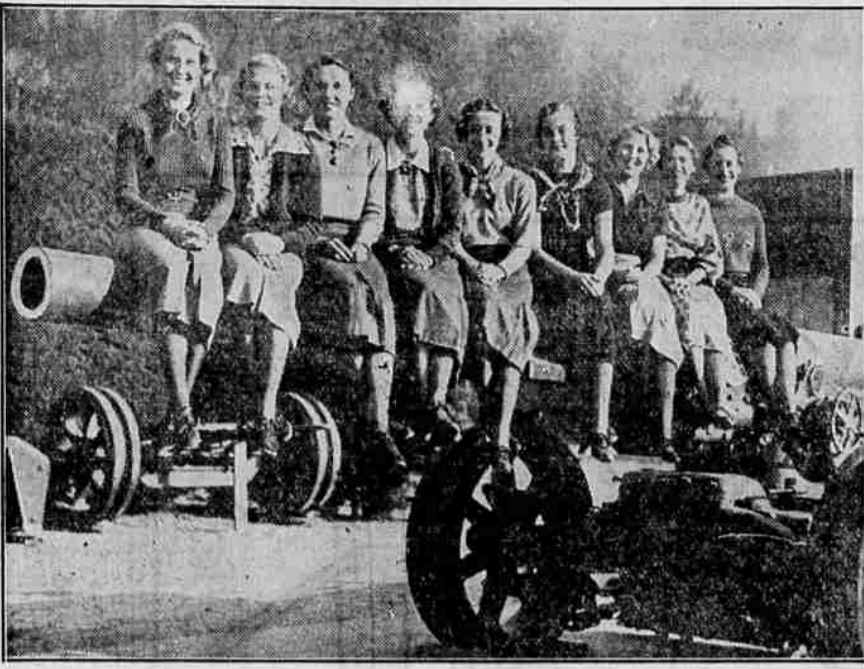
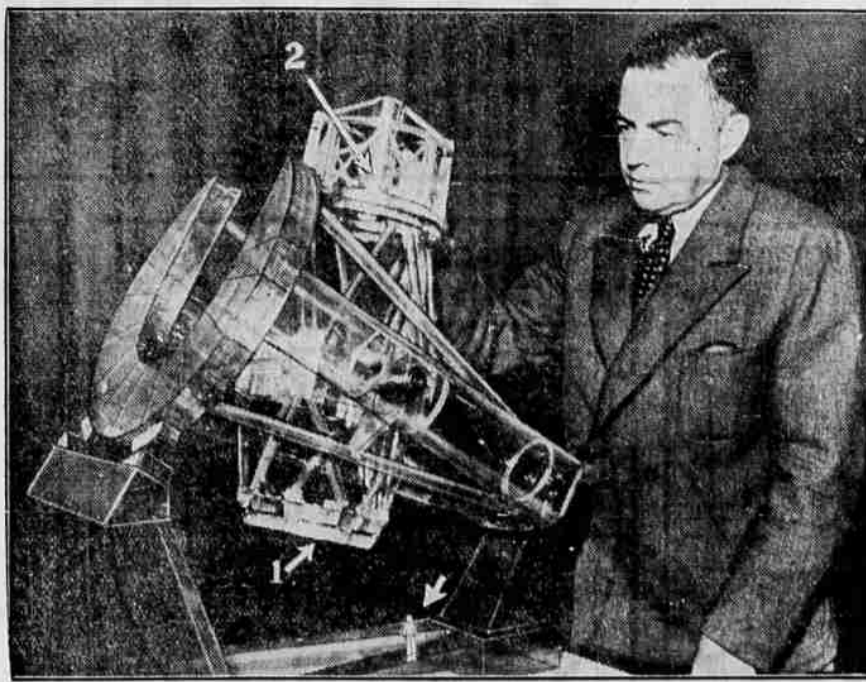


NINE CANDIDATES MAKE IT HARD TO PICK COLONEL

TRANSPARENT MODEL OF WORLD'S LARGEST 'EYEPIECE'



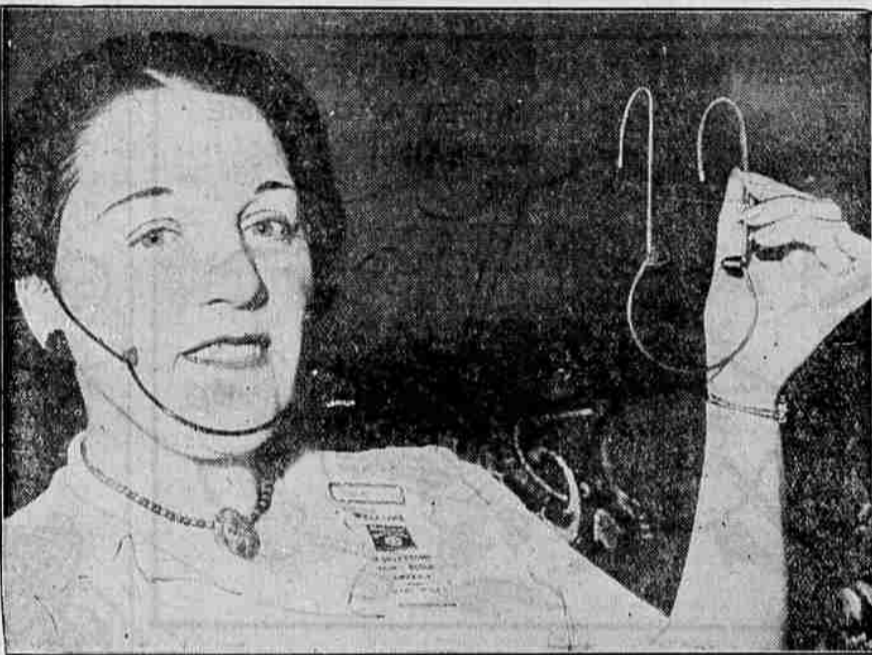

LABOR LEADERS SEEK FEDERATION PEACE



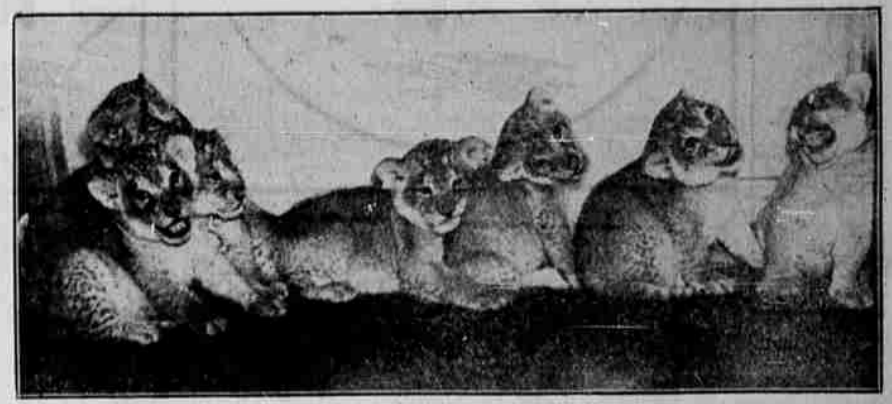
