STOCK REGULATION TRACED BY HICKS

Events leading up to the creation of the securities exchange commission to regulate stock market operations were traced by Edwin D. Hicks, Medford attorney, at today's weekly luncheon-meeting of the Kiwanis club in the Hotel Medford.

The commission, Mr. Hicks said, would undoubtedly overcome many of the reprehensible practices condoned by market practitioners in the past. In the commission he saw protection for the people who invest legitimately in stocks and bonds.

Mr. Hicks described the various methods by which small investors were fleeced through stock market manipulation of one kind or another. He declared the trickery permitted by stock exchange rules in the past jeopardized legitimate business and caused many commercial failures.
