TIGERS LOOK GOOD IN FINAL WORKOUT FOR EUGENE TILT

Interference and Offensive Back Near Early Season Form—Will Shoot Works Against Eugene Axmen

The Medford high school Tigers last night romped through their last scrimmage of the year with all the snap and speed that marked their early season performance, the interferences shearing away would-be tacklers and the first string cutting and tearing for long and consistent yardage against a stubborn utility eleven.

For the first time since the team was ripped to ribbons by eligibility technicalities and injuries, Coach Bowerman's charges really clicked and hopes were again arising here today that the remodeled Black Toronado would bowl over the undefeated and untied Eugene Axmen on the Eugene field Thanksgiving Day.

With the betting odds against them for the second time this year (the Salem game was the other) the Tigers seem to have more fire than at any time during the season. Tonight they will hold a light workout and tomorrow morning will board the northbound Bhasia for the last game of the year.

For several it will be the last game under the Red and Black banner of Medford. Thirteen men who will make the northward jaunt will be graduated at mid-year or in the spring, many of them to go on to college careers. Those graduating will be Bayliss, Maryama, Blair, Mahop, Henry, Todd, Offord, Baker.

RECORD GAME CROWD EXPECTED IN LOS A.

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 24.—(P)—Statisticians sharpened their pencils today and figured Los Angeles might produce the biggest crowd of the American football season on Thanksgiving day.

Southern California and the University of California at Los Angeles are renewing a cross-town grid rivalry in Memorial coliseum, which has 101,516 seats.

More than 80,000 have been sold. U. S. C.'s graduate manager, Arnold Eddy, announced, and a conservative guess is at least 95,000 persons will see the kickoff.

Gate receipts are expected to total more than \$250,000.

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Edible Bullets Will Cut Deaths In Duck Family

WASHINGTON, Nov. 24.—(P)—The government offered edible bullets today to cut the death rate among ducks the hunters miss.

So many ducks, unhit, have died from lead poisoning when they scooped up lead pellets in their search for food that Dr. E. J. Shillinger of the biological survey set out to solve the problem.

By combining magnesium with the lead, Dr. Shillinger produced a non-poisonous shot that will disintegrate in water or in a duck's gizzard.
