

'Horn of Plenty' Salad For Thanksgiving Menu

A Thanksgiving Day menu featured by a "horn of plenty salad" with peas as the principal ingredient, is offered by Mrs. Alexander George, noted Assorted Press cookery expert.

Several "last minute helps" are also offered by Mrs. George to aid in filling gaps in meal planning for the Thanksgiving holiday.

Begin With Salad

For this old-fashioned Thanksgiving dinner:

- Thanksgiving Dinner for Eight.**
 Horn of Plenty Salad
 Roast Turkey Sausage Stuffing
 Mashed Turnips
 Candied Sweet Potatoes
 Giblet Gravy Pickled Beets
 Rolls Cranberry Jelly
 Pumpkin Tarts Modern
 Coffee

- Horn of Plenty Salad.**
 26 white cherries, seeded
 8 slices pineapple, diced
 8 halves canned pears
 8 almonds
 16 red cherries
 3 green candy strings
 2-3 cup stiff mayonnaise
 1/4 cup French dressing
 Combine fruits and French dressing. Chill. Arrange white cherries and pineapple on crisp lettuce. Cover with pears and candy strings to represent "fruit" coming out of the pear horn. Top with mayonnaise.

- Sausage Stuffing.**
 (For 10-12 persons)
 1 pound ground sausage
 2 tablespoons minced onions
 1-3 cup diced celery
 2 tablespoons minced parsley
 1/2 teaspoon poultry seasoning
 6 cups soft bread, crumbled
 1-3 cup butter, melted
 1 egg, beaten
 1/4 cup hot milk
 Heat frying pan, add and quickly brown sausage. Add onions, celery and parsley. Cook 4 minutes. Add rest of ingredients, mixing lightly with fork. Cook 2 minutes. Stuff fowl.

- Pumpkin Tarts Modern.**
 12 unbaked deep tarts
 3 cups cooked pumpkin (canned)
 1 cup dark brown sugar
 1 cup sugar
 1 tablespoon cinnamon
 1 teaspoon nutmeg
 1 teaspoon cloves
 1 teaspoon salt
 8 eggs, beaten
 4 cups milk
 1/2 cup black walnuts
 1/4 cup candied ginger, chopped
 2 cups whipped cream
 Mix pumpkin, sugar, spices, salt, egg and milk. Fill deep tarts placed in muffin pans. Bake 10 minutes in moderately hot oven, lower fire and bake 25 minutes in moderately slow oven. Cool tarts in pans.

- Here are some recipes which may be the ones needed to fill in the gap of your meal planning for the Thanksgiving holiday:
- Peanut Corn Strips.**
 1 cup molasses
 1 cup sugar
 1/4 cup water
 1 tablespoon vinegar
 1/2 teaspoon soda
 4 cups popped corn
 1 1/2 cups shelled roasted nuts
 1/4 teaspoon salt
 Boil molasses, sugar, water and vinegar without stirring. When thread firm, or a hard click ball when tested in cold water, add soda and mix

SISKIYOU HIGHWAY PAVING JOB BEGUN

Equipment was being lined up today for the surfacing of about eight miles of the new Siskiyou highway. Work is being supervised by foreman of the E. C. Hall company of Eugene, contractor for the job.

When the contract is completed about October 31 next year, motorists will be able to drive over the new route from Ashland to Siskiyou station where the new highway intersects with the old.

The eight miles will be surfaced with bituminous macadam or "non-skid blacktop" in contrast to the concrete paving now completed on the first two miles of the route.

FARMERS INCOMES UP 13 PER CENT IN FAR WEST STATES

Federal Computation Based On 36 Products During September, As Compared With Some Months 1935

 SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 25.—(AP)—Farm incomes in the 11 far western states were 13 per cent higher in September this year than last, the federal department of agriculture figures showed today.

The federal computation, based on 36 products, fell considerably short

of covering the great diversity of west production. Nevertheless it gave a total farm income for the month of \$139,563,000 compared with \$123,358,000 in Sept. 1935.

The September 1936 income was more than 25 millions higher than in September 1935. This gain in 3 years was about 60 per cent.

Year Shows Gain
 The far west's farm income for the first three-quarters of the year was up 18 per cent from last year. It amounted to \$549,428,000 compared with \$473,281,000 in the like 9 months of 1935. In 1934, the 9 months produced some 655 millions farm income, and in 1933 about 507 millions. Continuation of the 16 per cent rate of gain over last year during the remaining 3 months would give the far west a total 1936 farm income of more than \$1,248,000,000.

Increased sales of potatoes, barley, fruits and vegetables, as well as higher prices, and larger receipts from sale of livestock, boosted the far western income.

Whole Country Better
 The west's gains were smaller on a percentage basis than those for the nation as a whole, which gained 16 per cent in September and 18 per

cent for the 9 months period. The 11 states accounted for about 16 per cent of the national farm income of \$48,234,000,000 estimated for the 9 months.

All states but Montana bettered the 1935 figures for the 9 months by a considerable margin. In Montana the drought-blasted wheat crop showed its effects, and left the state with only a negligible gain for the period. September figures recorded declines under last year to Montana, Utah and Washington.

Montana's September income drop-

ped back almost to the 1934 level, or to \$12,719,000 from \$16,442,000 in the 1935 month. For the 9 months it was \$48,838,000 against \$48,812,000 last year.

Washington Profit Up
 Washington cash receipts dipped to \$16,064,000 from \$16,913,000 for September, but gained to \$97,888,000 from \$89,920,000 for the 9 months. Idaho's \$9,505,000 farm income in

September compared with \$9,058,000 last year; for 9 months \$50,929,000 against \$32,468,000 last year.

Oregon reported \$10,099,000 for Sept. against \$8,794,000; 9 months \$42,762,000 against \$52,131,000.
