AMERICANS REACH VALENCIA SAFELY

WASHINGTON, Nov. 27.—(AP)—Word that 30 American refugees fleeing shell-torn Madrid had reached their goal—the shelter of a navy cruiser at Valencia—brought relief today to tense officials at the state department.

About as many more were believed to have reached the city of Valencia, and a radio message from navy officers at the scene promised that all would be safely quarantined aboard the vessel, the U. S. S. Raleigh, by tonight.

MADRID, Nov. 27.—(AP)—General Kieber, socialist commander of the 11th international brigade, declared today government forces "will drive the insurgents from the gates of Madrid by Christmas."

"We are rapidly forging an army out of the excellent militia material at hand," he said in his headquarters in the capital's most exclusive golf club house.

Two Foreign Ships Held In Portland

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 27.—(AP)—Only two foreign vessels remain in Portland's strike-bound harbor. The departure of the Danish motorship Nordpol and the Greek steamer Nemea left only the Chinese Haru and the Yajoi Maru.

The departing ships were bound from British Columbia ports to take on grain and lumber for Japan. Because of strike conditions here, they were unable to load cargo.
