GERTRUDE STEIN ADDS CONFUSION BY DOG MENTION: NEW YORK—(AP) Gertrude Stein has gone to the dogs to illustrate points in her new book. It's hard on the dogs. This because only one man is on record (so far) as understanding what the book is about. He is Thornton Wilder, and even Professor Wilder admits parts of it stump him. There's the title, for example: "The Geographical History of America or the Relation of Human Nature to the Human Mind." Probably for the first time in literary history, a publisher confesses publicly that he doesn't understand one of his own books. Bennett Cerf prints a publisher's note on the jacket. Part of it reads: "... I must admit frankly that I do not know what Miss Stein is talking about. I do not even understand the title. I admire Miss Stein tremendously, and I like to publish her books, although most of the time I do not know what she is driving at. That, Miss Stein tells me, is because I am dumb." But to the dogs. Miss Stein uses dogs as a kind of landmark. She refers to them most of the time when she wishes to indicate identity. Sample: "The old woman said I am I because my little dog knows me, but the dog knew that he was he because he knew that he was he as well as knowing that he knew she."
