

# PRESIDENT TAKES OFFICE JAN. 20TH; CONGRESS JAN. 5TH

### Inauguration Advanced by Norris Lame Duck Amendment—Capital Usually Cold, Drab First Month

WASHINGTON — (UP) — The next president of the United States for the first time in history will be inaugurated in mid-winter—January 20, instead of March 4, as a result of the Norris "lame duck" amendment.

on the capital may be the inauguration greeting for President Roosevelt. Four years ago Franklin D. Roosevelt was inaugurated on the center of capitol steps on March 4. The day was hazy, chilly and windy.

**Term Cut Short**  
Next year, as a result of an amendment to the constitution sponsored by Sen. George Norris (Republican) Neb., the president must take his oath of office six weeks before any predecessor—in January—often a blustering, snowy month even as far south as the languid Potomac.

Norris sponsored the constitutional amendment in the belief that the "lame duck" congress in modern times was a relic of the past, with its slow transportation arrangements.

Now with airplane and stream-lined train, he argued the will of the people in a November election should rest on legislation with the beginning of the new year after the election.

Congress Meets January 5  
This congress will meet—a new congress—on January 5 and the president inaugurated on January 20 for the first time. President Roosevelt therefore finds himself the first president in history with a term cut short. One major hazard to the inauguration has resulted from the Norris amendment. Previously a "lame duck" congress has met in January—a congress already organized—to give official benediction to the electoral college count.

The new amendment provides that on January 6, one day after the new congress convenes, house and senate will sit in joint session and give legal status to the electoral vote.

However, the possibility has risen that the house—an admixture of political affiliations—may be unable to organize by that date. A strong bloc conceivably could delay election of a new speaker so that the joint session would be delayed.

**May Need New Law**  
In that event a new law would have to be rushed through setting another date for verification of the electoral vote. This would be necessary in event of the house failing to organize, if the president is to take the oath on January 20.

Inauguration day often has been a day of rough weather, straining the physical strength of government officials, particularly of justices of supreme court who usually attend en masse. March is blustery and dangerous in

Washington. January is even more so. The capital for several years past has been susceptible to New England wintry weather. A spell of it in January could affect the glamour of inauguration day. The drive from the White House to the capitol by the president conceivably could be through a driving blizzard.

# BIGGEST TOY PACK SINCE 1929 READY FOR SANTA CLAUS

NEW YORK—(UP)—Santa Claus this Christmas will carry his biggest pack since 1929, according to the Toy Institute here. The retail toy volume is expected to reach \$215,000,000, a 15 per cent increase over last year.

Reflecting America's dominant interests Santa's pack will introduce more than 1,000 new science building, transportation and housekeeping toys as well as a record crop of handcraft sets. The predominance of toys reproducing peaceful arts and industries and home equipment as contrasted with European emphasis on uniformed dolls was demonstrated at the annual preview of Christmas toys held by toy manufacturers here.

The G-men's law enforcement activities, cowboys, policemen and historical military events are the only battle strategies featured and represent less than 1 percent of the total volume.

Movie, radio stars and newspaper comic characters sponsor a double quota of educational play sets, ball-rooms, games, costumes, wheel toys and even children's furniture. There is a record number of dolls, dolls with hair, and complete doll wardrobes. Popular new children's books use games and art to make learning to read interesting.

"The dominant interests of the adult are inevitably reflected by toyland," said James L. Fri, managing director of the Toy association.

"Yuletide, 1936, marks 20 years of development in the American toy industry which has closely followed the advancement in science, art, industry and general living standards reflected in American life. Since the caveman's days, toys have been designed to look like group models; but modern toys also aim to be purposeful, safe, durable and educational in the fullest sense."
