

CAMPAIGN WAGED IN BUENOS AIRES FOR PURER MILK

BUENOS AIRES—(UP)—Hygienic distribution of Buenos Aires' milk supply is being urged by civic organizations, including most of the city's influential newspapers.

The municipal government is being asked to compel dairies, large and small, to adopt a better sanitary policy to insure perfect cleanliness in handling the supply and also to curtail the practice of watering the milk.

Municipal control of the city's supply has been suggested as a means of guaranteeing pure milk. Pasteurization to eliminate possible germs and sterilization of containers are declared to be urgent necessities to protect the public health.

Statistics of milk producers' commission, which at three of the city's milk depots inspects the incoming shipments to determine fat and other content in addition to judging the proper condition of milk cans, show that there is .054 per cent of water in the milk received at the depots.

It is estimated that there are 62 liters of water in each 150,000 liters of milk received at the various depots daily. However, the milk producers organization charges that 200,000 liters of water are added to the milk before it is sold to the public.

Distribution of the city's milk still is one of the interesting sights in Buenos Aires. Usually the milk is sold by milkmen whose horse-drawn carts, each with two large wheels, are daily spectacles in the streets. In some districts cows are milked in front of the customers' doors.

The milkmen make daily calls upon customers. They carry tin containers and a small measuring basin and then into the customer's pail or bottle. Sometimes sales are made in the streets, instead of in the customer's house.

Some milk is distributed in bottles.
